Carol Mehochko, Academic Agent: Special Programs, provided a presentation on the District's Learning, Continuity and Attendance Plan (LCAP).

C. <u>COMMENTS</u>

C.1 PUBLIC COMMENTS FROM THE FLOOR

At this time, any person wishing to speak on any item **not on** the Agenda will be granted three minutes.

Mirna Ruiz, Community Member, asked to once again share with the Board about students that receive services from Special Education. She indicated that there are students whose IEP's are yet to be done, and they are playing catch up from November of 2019. She said that the District is not keeping up with the mission nor strategic goals in place and this is very frustrating for parents, as the ones that keep suffering the consequences are our children. She requested that the Board request reports of IEP's that are currently out of compliance to validate this.

She also inquired of the Board as to why there are waiting lists for students to get the necessary technology to access their education, as this should not be happening. She gave the example of Carter High School who has a waiting list for hotspots, yet parents are receiving poor work notices for their students. She questioned why parents who have parent Advocates or Attorneys get special treatment, when there are parents that cannot afford

to have legal representation, and they also deserve to be heard and treated with respect.

She asked why Parents of English Learners have yet to see a school wide plan, when parents have been asking for this plan for several years now, and all that happens is that meetings are scheduled with no results. She understands the crisis and hiccups the District is going through, but indicated that some of the concerns were prior to COVID-19.

C.3 COMMENTS FROM ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS

Lisa Lindberg, REA President, shared that this Friday, classes will be leveled at the elementary and middle schools. What this means is that all classes will be at or below contractual class size limits per our contract. She requested that as the Board makes decisions on the distribution of students and teachers, to please keep in mind that moving students to another teacher and having that teacher move school sites will be very disruptive. She also indicated that combination classes are not the best solution when schools are running normally, and increasing the number of combinations during Distance Learning is not the answer. She asked that the Board consider hiring teachers at the sites where they are needed and not collapsing classes and disrupting students' learning. She reminded the Board that all decisions must be made in the best interest of students.

Mirna Ruiz, Community Member, urged the Board not to approve the Learning Continuity and Attendance Plan under reference D.1.1. of the agenda. She said that the plan is not complete, and has no parent input. She understands that three required meetings have been done, however, the discussions have only been presentations, not actual input from parents. Therefore, this plan has had no voice from the parents. She asked the Board not to approve the plan until all stakeholders have genuinely participated. She said that rushing a plan will only cause it to fail.

Brenda Parker, Instructional Technology Assistant, shared her concern with moving forward with the Learning, Attendance and Continuity Plan. During the last Learning, Continuity and Attendance Plan meeting, it was expressed by many that the proposal was not complete and ready for approval. She indicated that there has not been enough parent participation and input to solidify the approval of this proposal. The meetings that were held only consisted of presentations and not public input. She shared that due to the malware issues and the late posting of the proposal's draft the public was unable to review the proposal and offer input. The data that was collected thus far is not a representation of the district's parents' voice. She feels that it is imperative that imperative that this proposal is tabled until further input can be gathered and added to the proposal.

D.1.1 LEARNING CONTINUITY AND ATTENDANCE PLAN ADOPTION: FY 2020-21

RELEASE OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of maintaining the confidentiality of directory information and therefore authorizes the release of such information only in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee may authorize the release of student directory information to representatives of the news media, prospective employers or nonprofit organizations as provided by law, **Board policy, and administrative regulation.** Unless prohibited by the parent/guardian in accordance with law, directory information which school officials may disclose consists of the following: student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of athletic team members, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and most recent previous school attended.

The Superintendent or designee may limit or deny the release of specific directory information to any public or private nonprofit organization based on his/her determination of the best interest of the student. (Education Code 49073)

Military services representatives shall have access to directory information.

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have access to directory information. Military recruiters shall have access to a student's name, address, and telephone number, unless the parent/guardian has specified that the information not be released in accordance with law and administrative regulation. (20 USC 7908; 10 USC 503; Education Code 49603)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures regarding the release of directory information and notification of parents/guardians, including the right of parents/guardians to opt out of providing directory information to third parties.

Under no circumstances shall directory information be disclosed to a private profit-making entity other than employers, prospective employers, and representatives of the news media except for representatives of the news media and prospective employers, in accordance with Board Policy. Private schools and colleges may be given the names and addresses of 12th-grade students and students who are no longer enrolled provided they use this information only for purposes directly related to the institution's academic or professional goals. (Education Code 49073)

CHARTER SCHOOL AUTHORIZATION

The Board of Education recognizes that charter schools may assist the district in offering diverse learning opportunities for district students. In considering any petition to establish a charter school within the district, the Board shall give careful consideration to the potential of the charter school to provide students with a high-quality education that enables them to achieve to their fullest potential.

One or more persons may submit a petition for a start-up charter school to be established within the district. In addition, an existing district school may be converted to a charter school when deemed beneficial by the district and community or when state or federal law requires restructuring of the school because of low performance.

(cf. 0520.2 - Title I Program Improvement Schools)

Any petition for a start-up charter school or conversion charter school shall include all components and signatures and statements required by law, as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. The proposed charter shall be attached to the petition. and shall be submitted to the Board.

The Superintendent or designee may work with charter school petitioners prior to the formal submission of the petition in order to ensure compliance of the petition with legal requirements. As needed, he/she also may meet with the petitioners to establish workable plans for technical assistance or contracted services which the district may provide to the proposed charter school.

Within 30-60 days of receiving a petition to establish a charter school, the Board shall hold a public hearing on the charter provisions, at which time the Board shall consider determine the level of support for the petition by teachers, other employees of the district, and parents/guardians. (Education Code 47605)

The Board shall either grant or deny the petition at a public hearing held within 90 days of receiving the petition, or within 120 days with the consent of both the petitioner and the Board (Education Code 47605)

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices)

At least 15 days before the public hearing at which the Board will grant or deny the charter, the district shall publish all staff recommendations regarding the petition, including any recommended findings and, if applicable, certification from the County Superintendent of Schools regarding the potential fiscal impact of the charter schools on the district. During the public hearing, the petitioners shall have equal time and opportunity to present evidence and testimony in response to the staff recommendations

and findings. Within 60 days of receiving a petition, or within 90 days with mutual consent of the petitioners and the Board, the Board shall either approve or deny the request to establish the charter school. (Education Code 47605)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain accurate records, in relation to each charter petition, of documents submitted, the Board's proceedings, and the findings upon which the Board's decision is made.

The approval or denial of a charter petition shall not be controlled by collective bargaining agreements nor subject to review or regulation by the Public Employment Relations Board. (Education Code 47611.5)

Approval of Petition

The Board shall approve the charter petition if doing so is consistent with sound educational practice. A charter petition shall be granted only if the Board is satisfied that doing so is consistent with sound educational practice and the interests of the community in which the school is proposing to locate. In granting charters, the Board shall consider the academic needs of the students the charter school proposes to serve and shall give preference to schools best able to provide comprehensive learning experiences for academically low-achieving students according to standards established by the California Department of Education (CDE) under Education Code 54032. (Education Code 47605)

Prior to authorizing any charter, the Board shall verify that the charter includes adequate processes and measures for monitoring and holding the school accountable for fulfilling the terms of its charter and complying with all applicable laws, including Education Code 47604.\[abla]. Such processes and measures shall include, but are not limited to, fiscal accountability systems, multiple measures for evaluating the educational program, inspection and observations of any part of the charter school, and regular reports to the Board.

The Board may initially grant a charter for a specified term not to exceed five years.

(Education Code 47607) (cf. 0420.42 - Charter School Renewal)

(cf. 0420.43 - Charter School Revocation)

The Board shall ensure that any approved charter contains adequate processes and measures for holding the school accountable for fulfilling the terms of its charter. These shall include, but not be limited to, fiscal accountability systems, multiple measures for evaluating the educational program, and regular reports to the Board.

(cf. 0420.41 - Charter School Oversight)

The approval or denial of a charter petition shall not be controlled by collective bargaining agreements nor subject to review or regulation by the Public Employment Relations Board. (Education Code 47611.5)

The district shall not require any district student to attend the charter school nor shall it require any district employee to work at the charter school. (Education Code 47605)

The Board may approve one or more memoranda of understanding to clarify the financial and operational agreements between the district and the charter school. Any such memorandum of understanding shall be annually reviewed by the Board and charter school governing body and amended as necessary.

When a petition is approved by the Board it # shall be the responsibility of the petitioners to provide written notice of the Board's approval and a copy of the charter to the County Superintendent of Schools, the CDE, and the State Board of Education (SBE). (Education Code 47605)

Denial of Petition

The Board shall summarily deny any charter petition that proposes to:

deny any petition to authorize the conversion of a private school to a charter school or that proposes to serve students in a grade level that is not served by the district, unless the petition proposes to serve students in all the grade levels served by the district. (Education Code 47602, 47605; 5 CCR 11965)

Any other charter petition shall be denied only if the Board presents written factual findings specific to the petition that one or more of the following conditions exist: (Education Code 47605)

- 1. Operate a The charter school as or by a for-profit corporation, a for-profit educational management organization, or a for-profit charter management organization (Educational Code 47604) presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the charter school.
- 2. Convert a private school to a charter school (Education Code 47602) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- 3. Serve students in a grade level that is not served by the district, unless the petition proposes to serve students in all the grade levels served by the district (Education Code 47605) does not contain the number of signatures required.
- 4. Offer nonclassroom-based instruction (Education Code 47612.7) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code 47605(d).

5. The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the charter provisions in Education Code 47605(b).

Regarding all other charter petitions, the The Board shall not deny a petition only if the Board makes written factual findings specific to the petition that one or more of the following conditions exist: based on the actual or potential costs of serving students with disabilities, nor shall it deny a petition solely because the charter school might enroll disabled students who reside outside the special education local plan area in which the district participates. (Education Code 47605;5 47605.7, 47647 CCR 11967.5.1)

(cf. 0430 - Comprehensive Local Plan for Special Education)

- 1. The Charter school presents an unsound educational program that has a likelihood of physical, educational, or psychological harm to, or which is not likely to provide an educational benefit for, the student to be enrolled in the charter school.
- 2. The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- 3. The petition does not contain the number of signatures required.
- 4. The petition does not contain a clear, unequivocal statement described in Education Code 47605(e), including that the charter school will be nonsectarian and that the school shall not charge tuition or discriminate against any student based on the characteristics specified in Education Code 220.
- 5. The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the charter provisions in Education Code 47605(c).
- 6. The petition does not contain a declaration as to whether or not the charter school shall be deemed the exclusive public employer of the school's employees for purposes of collective bargaining pursuant to Government Code 3540-3549.3.
- 7. The charter school is demonstrably unlikely to serve the interests of the entire community in which the school is proposing to locate. Analysis of this finding shall include consideration of the fiscal impact of the proposed charter school. A written factual finding shall detail specific facts and circumstances regarding:
- a. The extent to which the proposed charter school would substantially undermine existing services, academic offerings, or programmatic offerings
- b. Whether the proposed charter school would duplicate a program currently offered within the district, when the existing program has sufficient capacity for the students proposed to be served within reasonable proximity to where the charter school intends to locate.

8. The district is not positioned to absorb the fiscal impact of the proposed charter school. The district meets this criterion if it has a negative interim certification, or has a qualified interim result in the district having a negative interim certification.

If the The Board shall not denies deny a petition based on the actual or potential costs of serving students with disabilities, nor shall it deny a petition solely because the charter school might enroll students with disabilities who reside outside the special education local plan area in which the district participates. the petitioners may choose to submit the petition to the County Board of Education and, if then denied by the County Board, to the SBE. (Education Code 47605.7, 47647)

(cf. 0430 - Comprehensive Local Plan for Special Education)

Appeals

If the Board denies a petition, the petitioner may choose to submit the petition to the County Board of Education and , if then denied by the County Board, to SBE. (Education Code 47605)

At the request of the petitioner, the Board shall prepare the documentary record, including a transcript of the public hearing at which the Board denied the charter, no later than 10 business days after the petitioner makes the request. (Education Code 47605)

Within 30 days of receipt of an appeal submitted to SBE, the Board may submit a written opposition to SBE detailing, with specific citations to the documentary record, how the Board did not abuse its discretion in denying the petition. (Education Code 47605)

If either the County Board or SBE remands the petition to the Board because the petition on appeal contains new or different materials terms, the Board shall consider the petition and grant shall or deny the petition within 30 days. (Education Code 47605)

CHARTER SCHOOL OVERSIGHT

The **Governing** Board of Education recognizes its ongoing responsibility to ensure oversee that any charter school authorized by the Board is successfully fulfilling the terms of its charter and is providing a high-quality educational program for students enrolled in the charter school.

(cf. 0420.4 - Charter School Authorization)

(cf. 0500 - Accountability)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify at least one staff member to serve as a contact **person** for each charter school **authorized by the Board**. (Education Code 47604.32)

The Board and Superintendent or designee may inspect or observe any part of the charter school at any time. The Superintendent or designee shall visit each charter school at least annually and may inspect or observe any part of a charter school at any time. (Education Code 47604.32, 47607)

The Superintendent or designated charter school contact shall attend meetings of the charter school governing body whenever possible and shall periodically meet with the representative of the charter school.

Waivers

If the charter school wishes to request a general waiver of any state law or regulation applicable to it, it shall request that the district submit a general waiver request of the State Board of Education (SBE) on its behalf. Upon approval of the Board, the Superintendent or designee shall submit such a waiver request to the SBE on behalf of the charter school.

(cf.1431 - Waivers)

Whenever a charter school operates as or is operated by a nonprofit public benefit corporation as authorized by Education Code 47604, the Superintendent shall recommend and the Board shall appoint a district representative, who may be the district's charter school contact, to serve as a voting or nonvoting member of the corporation's board of directors.

Provision of District Services

The district may charge for the actual costs of supervisorial oversight of a charter school not to exceed one percent of the charter school's revenue. If the district is able to provide substantially rent-free facilities to the charter school, the district may charge actual costs up to

three percent of the charter school's revenue for supervisorial oversight. (Education Code 47613)

(cf. 7160 - Charter School Facilities)

The charter school may separately purchase administrative or other services from the district or any other source. (Education Code 47613)

Whenever the district agrees to provide administrative or support services to a charter school, the district and the charter school shall develop a memorandum of understanding which clarifies the financial and operational agreements between them.

At the request of a charter school, the Superintendent or designee shall create and submit any reports required by the State Teachers' Retirement System or Public Employees' Retirement System on behalf of the charter school. The **district may charge the** charter school may be charged for the actual costs of the reporting services, but shall not be required the charter school to purchase payroll processing services from the district as a condition for creating and submitting these reports. (Education Code 47611.3)

Waivers

If the charter school wishes to request a general waiver of any state law or regulation, it shall request that the Superintendent or designee submit a general waiver request to the State Board of Education (SBE) on its behalf.

Material Revisions to Charter

Material revisions to a charter may be made only be made with Board approval. Material revisions shall be governed by the same standards and criteria that apply to new charter petitions for the authorization charter schools as set forth in Education Code 47605 and shall include, but not be limited to, a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of for charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed. (Education Code 47607)

If an approved charter school proposes to expand—establish or move operations to one or more additional sites or grade levels, within the district's boundaries, the charter school shall request a material revision to its charter and shall notify the Board of those additional locations or grade levels. The Board shall consider approval of the additional locations or grade levels at an open meeting. (Education Code 47605)

The Board shall have the authority to determine whether a proposed change in charter school operations constitutes a material revision of the approved charter.

Monitoring Charter School Performance

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board on the charter school's performance, based on the academic and fiscal accountability measures specified in the approved charter. monitor each charter school that is authorized by the district to determine whether it complies with all legal requirements applicable to charter schools, including making all reports required of charter schools in accordance with Education Code 47604.32. Any violations of law shall be reported to the Board.

In providing general oversight of a charter school, the Board and the Superintendent or designee shall determine whether the school complies with all legal requirements applicable to charter schools, including making all reports required of charter schools in accordance with Education Code 47604.32.

The Board shall monitor each charter school to determine whether it is achieving the measurable student outcomes set forth in the charter, both schoolwide and for each numerically significant student subgroup served by the school as defined in Education Code 52052. This determination shall be based on the measures specified in the approved charter and any applicable memorandum of understating, and on the charter school's annual review and assessment of its progress toward the goals and actions identified in its local control and accountability plan (LCAP), as reported in the California School Dashboard

The Board shall monitor the fiscal condition of the charter school based on any financial report or information obtained from the charter school, including, but not limited to, the charter school's preliminary budget, annual update of the charter school's LCAP, first and second interim financial reports, and final unaudited report for the full prior year. (Education Code 47604.32, 47604.33, 47606.5)

The Board shall monitor each charter school to determine whether it is achieving the outcomes for student learning set forth in the charter agreement. In addition, the Board shall determine whether the charter school makes "adequate yearly progress" as defined by the SBE and federal Title I accountability requirements. If a charter school fails to make

adequate yearly progress for two or more consecutive years, the Board shall take action for program improvement in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulations.

(cf. 0520.2 - Title I Program Improvement Schools)

Evaluation data for the charter school shall be considered in the Board's determination of the renewal or revocation of a charter.

(cf. 0420.42 - Charter School Renewal) (cf. 0420.43 - Charter School Revocation) School ClosureIn the event that the Board revokes or denies renewal of a charter or the school closes for any other reason, the Superintendent or designee shall provide assistance, when applicable in accordance with the charter and/or a memorandum of understanding, to facilitate the transfer of the charter school's former students and to finalize financial reporting and close out.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide notification to the California Department of Education, within 10 calendar days, if the charter school will cease operation for any reason. Such notification shall include, but not be limited to, a description of the circumstances of the closure, the effective date of the closure, and the location of student and personnel records. (Education Code 47604.32; 5 CCR 11962.1)

The district may charge up to one percent of a charter school's revenue for the actual costs of supervisorial oversight of the school. However, if the charter school is able to obtain substantially rent-free facilities from the district, the district may charge up to three percent of the charter school's revenue for actual costs of supervisorial oversight or, if the facility is provided under Education Code 47614, the-rata share facilities costs calculated pursuant to 5 CCR 11969.7. If the district charges the pro-rata share, it may also charge one percent of the charter school's revenue in oversight fees. If the district is given responsibility for supervisorial oversight of a charter school that was authorized by SBE on appeal, the district is not limited to these percentages and may charge for the actual costs of supervisorial oversight and for the administrative costs necessary to secure charter school funding. (Education Code 47613)

Technical Assistance/Intervention

Whenever a charter school is identified for technical assistance based on the performance of one or more numerically significant student subgroups on SBE-established criteria, the charter school shall receive technical assistance from the County Superintendent of Schools. Such technical assistance shall be focused on building the charter school's capacity to develop and implement actions and services responsive to student and community needs, including, but not limited to, any of the following: (Education Code 45607.3)

- 1. Assisting the charter school to identify its strengths and weaknesses in regard to the state priorities applicable to the charter school pursuant to Education Code 47605. This shall include working collaboratively with the charter school to review performance data on the state and local indicators included in the California School Dashboard and other relevant local data and to identify effective, evidence-based programs or practices that address any areas of weakness.
- 2. Working collaboratively with the charter school to secure assistance from an academic, programmatic, or fiscal expert or team of experts to identify and implement effective programs and practices that are designed to improve performance in any areas of weakness identified by the charter school. Another service provider, including, but not limited to, a school district,

county office of education, or charter school, may be solicited to act as a partner to the charter school in need of technical assistance.

3. Obtaining from the charter school timely documentation demonstrating that it has completed the activities described in items #1 and 2 or substantially similar activities, or has selected another service provider to work with the charter school to complete the activities described in items #1 and 2 or substantially similar activities, and ongoing communication with the Board to assess the charter school's progress in improving student outcomes.

In addition, if, in three out of four consecutive school years, a charter school fails to improve outcomes for three or more numerically significant student subgroups, or for all of the student subgroups if the school has fewer than three subgroups, in regard to one or more state or school priorities identified the charter, the district: Education Code 47607.3)

- 1. Shall provide technical assistance to the charter school based on the California School Dashboard
- 2. May request that the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), with SBE approval, assign the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence to provide advice and assistance to the charter school pursuant to Education Code 52704

In accordance with law, the Board may deny a charter school's renewal petition or may revoke a charter based on the charter school's poor performance, especially with regard to inadequate academic achievement of all numerically significant subgroups of students served by the charter school.

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Complaints

Each charter school shall establish and maintain policies and procedures to enable any person to file a complaint, in accordance with the uniform complaint procedures as specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670, alleging the school's noncompliance with Education Code 47606.5 or 47607.3. (Education Code 52075)

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(cf. 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures)
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A complaint who is not satisfied with the decision may appeal the decision to the SPI. (Education Code 52075)

If the charter school finds merit in the complaintor the SPI finds merit in an appeal, a remedy shall be provided to all affected students and parents/guardians. (Education Code 52075)

School Closure

In the event that the Board revokes or denies renewal of a charter or the charter school ceases operation for any reason, the Superintendent or designee shall, when applicable in accordance with the charter and/or a memorandum of understanding, provide assistance to facilitate the transfer of the charter school's former students and to finalize financial reporting and close-out.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide notification to the California Department of Education, within 10 calendar days of the Board's action, if renewal of the charter is denied, the charter is revoked, or the charter school will cease operations for any reason.

Such notification shall include, but not limited to, a description of the circumstances of the closure, the effective date of the closure, and the location of student and personnel records. (Education Code 47604.32; 5 CCR 11962.1)

CHARTER SCHOOL REVOCATION

The Governing Board of Education expects any charter school it authorizes to provide a sound educational program that promotes student learning and to carry out its operations in a manner that complies with law and the terms of its charter. The Board may revoke a charter in accordance with law.

(cf. 0420.4 - Charter School Authorization) (cf. 0420.41 - Charter School Oversight) (cf. 0420.42 - Charter School Renewal) (cf. 0500 - Accountability)

When the Board determines, in writing, that any violation under Education Code 47607 constitutes a severe and imminent threat to the health or safety of students, the Board may immediately revoke a the school's charter. before the date it is due to expire whenever the Board makes a written factual finding, supported by substantial evidence, that the charter school has done any of the following: When such a determination is made, the Board shall approve and deliver to the charter school's governing body, the County Board of Education, and the California Department of Education (CDE) a Notice of Revocation by Determination of a Severe and Imminent Threat to Pupil Health or Safety. (Education Code 47607; 5 CCR 11968.5.3)

In all other circumstances, the Board may revoke a charter after providing due process and using the procedures described below. The Board may revoke a charter if it makes a written factual finding specific to that charter school and supported by substantial evidence that the charter school has done any of the following: (Education Code 47607)

- 1. Committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in the charter
- 2. Failed to meet or pursue any of the student outcomes identified in the charter
- 3. Failed to meet generally accepted accounting principles or engaged in fiscal mismanagement
- 4. Violated any provision of law

The Board shall also consider revoking the charter of any charter school for which the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence (CCEE) has provided advice and assistance pursuant to Education Code 47607.3 if CCEE has issued either of the following findings: (Education Code 47607.3)

CHARTER SCHOOL REVOCATION (continued)

- 1. That the charter school has failed or is unable to implement the recommendations of the CCEE
- 2. That the inadequate performance of the charter school, as based on the California School Dashboard, is so persistent or acute as to require revocation of the charter

In determining whether to revoke a charter, the Board shall consider increases in student academic achievement for all "numerically significant" groups of students served by the charter school, as defined in Education Code 52052, as the most important factor. (Education Code 47607, 47607.3)

Revocation Procedures

At least 72 hours prior to any Board meeting at which the Board will consider issuing a Notice of Violation, the Board shall provide the charter school notice and all relevant documents related to the proposed action. (5 CCR 11968.5.2)

If the Board takes action to issue a Notice of Violation is considering a revocation of a charter school, it shall take action to approve and deliver the a Notice of Violation to the charter school's governing body. The Notice of Violation shall identify: (Education Code 47607; 5 CCR 11965, 11968.5.2)

- 1. The charter school's alleged violation(s)
- 2. All evidence relied upon by the Board in determining that the charter school committed the alleged violation(s), including the date and duration of the alleged violation(s). The Notice shall show that the each alleged violation(s) are is both material and uncured and that it occurred within a reasonable period of time before the Notice of Violation is issued.
- 3. The period of time that the Board has concluded is a reasonable period of time for the charter school to remedy or refute the identified violation(s). In identifying this time period, the Board shall consider the amount of time reasonably necessary to remedy each identified violation, which may include the charter school's estimation as to the anticipated remediation time.

At least72 hours prior to any meeting at which the Board will consider issuing a Notice of Violation, the Board shall provide the charter school with notice and all relevant documents related to the proposed action (5 CCR 11968.5.2)

CHARTER SCHOOL REVOCATION (continued)

By the end of the remedy period identified in the Notice of Violation, the charter school's governing body may submit to the Board a detailed written response and supporting evidence addressing each identified violation, including, as applicable, the a refutation, remedial action taken, or proposed remedial action. (5 CCR 11968.5.2)

Within 60 calendar days of the At the conclusion of the remedy period, specified in the Notice of Violation, the Board shall evaluate any response and supporting evidence provided by the charter school's governing body and shall take on the of following actions: (5 CCR 11968.5.2)

- 1. Discontinue revocation of the charter and provide timely written notice of such action to the charter school's governing body
- 2. If there is substantial evidence that the charter school has failed to remedy a violation identified in the Notice of Violation or refute a violation to the Board's satisfaction, Continue revocation of the charter, by issuing a Notice of Intent to Revoke to the charter school's governing body within 60 calendar days of the conclusion of the remedy period, if there is substantial evidence that the charter school has failed to remedy a violation identified in the Notice of Violation or to refute a violation to the Board's satisfaction. All evidence relied upon by the Board for the decision shall be included in the Notice of Intent to Revoke.

If the Board issues a Notice of Intent to Revoke, it shall hold a public hearing concerning the revocation on the date specified in the notice, which shall be no later than 30 days after providing the notice. Within 30 calendar days after the public hearing, or within 60 calendar days if extended by written mutual agreement of the Board and the charter school, the Board shall issue a final decision to revoke or decline to revoke on the revocation of the charter. (Education Code 47607; 5 CCR 11968.5.2)

If the Board fails to meet the timelines specified above for issuing a Notice of Intent to Revoke or a final decision, the revocation process shall be deemed terminated. (5 CCR 11968.5.2)

Within 10 calendar days of the Board's final decision, the Superintendent or designee shall provide a copy of the final decision to the California Department of Education (CDE) and the County Board of Education. (Education Code 47604.32; 5 CCR 11968.5.2)

Severe and Imminent Threat

The procedures specified above shall not be applicable when the Board determines, in writing, that any violation under Education Code 47607 constitutes a severe and imminent threat to the health or safety of students.

In such circumstances, the Board may immediately revoke the school's charter by approving and delivering a Notice of Revocation by Determination of a Severe and Imminent Threat to Pupil Health or Safety to the charter school's governing body, the County Board, and the CDE. (Education Code 47607; 5 CCR 11968.5.3)

CHARTER SCHOOL REVOCATION (continued)

Appeals

In the event that If the Board revokes the charter, the charter school may, within 30 days of the Board's final decision, appeal the revocation to the County Board. The County's Board's decision may subsequently be appealed to the State Board of Education by either the charter school or the District. may subsequently appeal the County Board's decision to the SBE. However, a revocation based upon the findings of CCEE pursuant to Education Code 47607.3 may not be appealed. (Education Code 47607;, 47607.3; 5 CCR 11968.5.3-11968.5.5)

School Closure

If a charter school ceases operation due to revocation, the Board and/or the charter school shall implement the school closure procedures specified in the charter in accordance with Education COde 47605 and 5 CCR 11962. (Education Code 47603.32)

established by the California State Legislature in 1978. The goals are: (1) Increase the availability of information on college and work opportunities, (2) Raise achievement levels to increase the total number of college ready and career eligible high school graduates and (3) Use a minimum of 30% of the annual grant funding for direct tutoring or peer advising. Besides Rialto USD, there are nine (9) other San Bernardino County districts, three (3) 4-year Institutes of Higher Education, five (5) Community Colleges, the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools (SBCSS) and ten (10) Community Based and Non-Profit Organizations. Rialto Unified School District has a great partnership with CSUSB and is currently working with them on the Talent Search and the Upward

Bound Grants. CSUSB is the main administrator of this grant totaling \$2,308,552.

Reasoning: The goals of this grant match Rialto USD's Strategic Plan: Strategy 3: We

will create a culture of high expectations and Strategy 7: We will ensure resources and assets are allocated to directly support student learning. Rialto USD's contribution to this grant will be "in-kind" spaces to display information, tutoring and meetings, workshops and venues. "In-kind" time and effort spent by district and school staff, and "in-kind" matching funds spent on subs, supplies, equipment and furniture, student lunches for field trips, etc. At the K-8 level, the grant will concentrate on Families in Schools-Parent Engagement, financial literacy and high school transition. At the high school level, there will be case managed coaching and advising of 10% of the 9th/10th grade class and financial literacy. At the 11th/12th grade class there will be tutoring, workshops, family events, college application

assistance, Cash for College/ FAFSA & Dream Act Assistance.

Background:

In the current era of COVID-19 and the civil unrest, today's youth are experiencing an undue amount of pressure. These pressures include, but are not limited to, isolation and challenges with feeling disconnected with their schools and peers. As such, education and mental health professionals alike caution districts to place emphasis on balancing instruction and prioritizing emotional wellness of students, especially traditionally under- served groups. Clay Counseling Foundation, in conjunction with Young Visionaries Leadership Academy, propose to continue the focus on African American students in an effort to support the District in reducing the dropout and disproportional data of children grades 6-12.

Reasoning:

In line with the RUSD Local Control Accountability Plan Goal 3 (Student Engagement) and RUSD Strategic Plan Strategies 1 & 3, the Successfully Motivating African-American Resiliency and Training Clay Counseling Foundation in conjunction with Young Visionaries will provide a full-scale mentorship program to students at Rialto USD. The program will expand to include the following professional services:

- Clinical therapy to 50 Tier III students (per DBH contract);
- Life skill development, mindfulness, conflict resolution, substance abuse and/or anger management for up to 150 middle and high school students
- Four 6-week parenting courses to increase development of healthy parenting strategies and positive parent-school relations up to 50 parents
- Facilitate culturally responsive virtual assemblies (called circles) to up to 1,200 African American students enrolled in all 8 of the comprehensive middle and high schools. Students will engage in large group meetings of up to 75 students. There will be 16 sessions, one per school per semester.
- Provide intensive support to 200 students identified at-risk of learning loss and truancy
- Host collaborative meetings with district and school personnel to enhance program effectiveness

The case manager will monitor students' progress and response to interventions and augment service offerings as needed. Program administrators will utilize parent feedback, school feedback and participants' weekly self-evaluations to assess student's progress towards attendance, academic and/or behavioral goals.

Recommendation: Approve an agreement with Clay Counseling Foundation in conjunction with

Young Visionaries to provide a full-scale mentorship program to students at Rialto Unified School District and parenting courses, effective September 24,

2020 through June 30, 2021.

The Consolidated Application is used by the California Department of Education to distribute funds from various Federal programs to county offices, school districts, and charter schools throughout California. Every local educational agency (LEA) certifies the Spring Release data collections to document participation in Federal programs under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and provides assurances that the LEA will comply with the legal requirements of each program. The Spring Release of the application documents participation in various federal categorical programs and includes assurances that the LEA will comply with the legal requirements of each program. The Winter Release of the application, to be certified in February 2021, contains the LEA's entitlements for each funded program. Program entitlements are determined by formulas contained in the laws that created the programs. Out of each Federal program entitlement, LEAs allocate funds for direct administration and indirect support costs for programs operated by the LEA and allocates funds to schools for programs operated at school sites. The application is submitted online through a web-based Consolidated Application Reporting System (CARS). This Spring data collection for the 2020-2021 application was submitted by August 17, 2020, to indicate that the Rialto Unified School District requests participation in Federal programs including: Title I, Part A (Improving Basic Programs), Title II, Part A (Supporting Effective Instruction), Title III, Part A (Language Instruction for English Learner and Immigrant Students), and Title IV, Part A (Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grants). Federal guidelines also allow local non-profit private schools to participate with the public school district in the Federal programs included in the application. Those participating private schools are identified in this Spring data reporting.

Reasoning:

Federal Program Descriptions:

Title I, Part A: Helping Disadvantaged Children - A Federal program to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments.

Title II, Part A: Supporting Effective Instruction - A Federal program that increases student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality and effectiveness, increasing the number of teachers and principals who are effective in improving student

academic achievement in the classroom and providing low-income and minority students greater access to effective teachers, principals and school leaders.

Title III, Part A: Program for English Learner Students - A Federal program to provide supplementary programs and services to English learners (ELs). The purpose of the subgrant is to assist EL students to achieve high levels in academic subjects and achieve academic standards; assist teachers, principals and school leaders in developing and sustaining effective language instruction programs; promoting parental, family and community participation in language instructional programs for families of English learners.

Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grants - A Federal program to provide all students access to a well-rounded education; improve school conditions for learning; and improve the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.

Background: On January 1, 2019, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) activated

their operational practice of "Public Safety Power Shutoff" as a preventative measure in high wind/fire risk areas. Due to this new operational practice, Kordyak Elementary School's power has been "shut-off" for approximately 6 events, over the past year or so, and will continue as rate of occurrence is dependent on weather and environmental factors. Thus, the Emergency Power Resource Project (EPRP) began on November 1, 2019 to resolve

Rialto Unified School District's emergency back-up power needs.

The EPRP is a collaborative effort between the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), Rialto USD, SCE and our renewable partner – Onyx (as the developer) to address the emergency back-up power needs at

Kordyak Elementary School.

Reasoning: To qualify for CPUC's Self Generation Incentive Program (SGIP), RUSD

must establish a "Community Resource Center" at Kordyak Elementary School. A CRC serves the surrounding community affected by a PSPS event, with basic necessities such as: HVAC utility, water, charging stations for electronic devices, WIFI, rest area, etc. This will allow for Rialto

USD to qualify for the SGIP funding at Kordyak Elementary School.

Recommendation: Approve the Power Safety Power Shutoff Community Resource Center

(CRC) and License Agreement with Southern California Edison Company, at Kordyak Elementary School, from September 24, 2020 through September 24, 2025, with a renewal option of five (5) additional years.

SUFFICIENCY OF STANDARDS-ALLIGNED TEXTBOOKS AND INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

September 23, 2020

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Rialto Unified School District, in order to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 60119 (as revised by Chapter 900, Statutes of 2004), EC Section 60421 (a), and California Code of Regulation Title 5, Section 9531 (a) held a public hearing on September 23, 2020, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education provided at least ten (10) days notice of the public hearing posted in at least three public places within the District that stated the time, place, and purpose of the hearing, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education encouraged participation by parents, teachers, members of the community, and bargaining unit leaders in the public hearing, and;

WHEREAS, information provided at this public hearing for the Board of Education detailed the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students in the District, including English Learners, and;

WHEREAS, the definition of "sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials" means that each pupil has standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and/or to take home, and may have digital access to, and;

WHEREAS, consistent with recommended adoption cycles and content of curriculum frameworks, sufficient standards aligned textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English Learners, in mathematics, science, history-social science, and Reading/Language Arts, including the English language development component of the adopted English/Language Arts program, and;

WHEREAS, as part of the required hearing, the Board of Education must also make a written determination as to whether each pupil enrolled in a foreign language or health course has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the adoption cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the State Board for those subjects, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education shall also determine the availability of laboratory science equipment as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9 through 12.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that for the 2020-2021 school year, the Rialto Unified School District has provided each pupil with sufficient standards-aligned textbooks and instructional materials consistent with the law, adoption cycles, content of curriculum frameworks, and State advisories.

<u>Background</u>: Education requests authorization from the Board of Education to approve

Rialto Unified School District's Learning Continuity and Attendance Plan (LCP). This plan must be approved by the Board of Education by

September 30, 2020.

Reasoning: The Learning Continuity and Attendance Plan (Learning Continuity Plan) is

a key part of the overall budget package for K-12 that seeks to address funding stability for schools while providing information at the local educational agency (LEA) level for how student learning continuity will be addressed during the COVID-19 crisis in the 2020–21 school year. The provisions for the plan were approved by the Governor and Legislature in

June in SB 98 and can be found in EC Section 43509.

The District has held an extensive process to consult with various stakeholders during the creation of this plan. To begin, before the start of the 2020-21 school year, both bargaining units - REA (Rialto Education Association) and CSEA (California) met with District teams to negotiate MOU's (Memorandums of Understanding) in regards to return to work during Distance Learning and Hybrid models. For various components and requirements that are included in this plan, principals, teachers and other stakeholders were consulted. In addition, 4 public meetings were held via GoogleMeet to review and elicit feedback. Outside of these meetings, small group meetings with DELAC (District English Learner Advisory Committee) parents and parents of DAAPAC (District African American Parent Advisory Council) were also met with, facilitated by leaders representing Education Services. Finally, surveys were sent out to parents and families to response to this plan and approximately 1800 were returned by the closing date of the end of August; students were also surveys, with approximately 4400 4th - 12th graders responding.

The approved plan will be sent to San Bernardino Superintendent of Schools for review and approval. The final draft of this document has been available for stakeholders to inspect online at kec.rialto.k12.ca.us.
