DEBT ISSUANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Board of Education is committed to long-term capital and financial planning and recognizes that the issuance of debt is a key source for funding the improvement and maintenance of school facilities and managing cash flow. Any debt issued by the district shall be consistent with law and this policy.

(cf. 3000 - Concepts and Roles) (cf. 3460 - Financial Reports and Accountability) (cf. 7110 - Facilities Master Plan) (cf. 7210 - Facilities Financing)

The district shall not enter into indebtedness or liability that in any year exceeds the income and revenue provided for such year, unless two-thirds of the voters approve the obligation or one of the exceptions specified in law applies. (California Constitution, Article 16, Section 18)

When the Board determines that it is in the best interest of the district, the Board may issue debt or order an election to issue debt. The Superintendent or designee shall make recommendations to the Board regarding appropriate financing methods for capital projects or other projects that are authorized purposes for debt issuance. When approved by the Board and/or the voters as applicable, the Superintendent or designee shall administer and coordinate the district's debt issuance program and activities, including the timing of issuance, sizing of issuance, method of sale, structuring of the issue, and marketing strategies.

The Superintendent or designee shall retain a financial advisor, municipal advisor, investment advisor, and other financial services professionals as needed to assist with the structuring of the debt issuance and to provide general advice on the district's debt management program, financing options, investments, and compliance with legal requirements. Contracts for services provided by such advisors may be for a single transaction or for multiple transactions, consistent with the contracting requirements in Education Code 17596. In the event that the district issues debt through a negotiated sale, underwriters may be selected for multiple transactions if multiple issuances are planned for the same project. In addition, the district shall select a legal team on an as-needed basis to assist with debt issuances or special projects.

(cf. 3312 - Contracts) (cf. 3600 - Consultants) (cf. 9270 - Conflict of Interest)

Goals

The district's debt issuance activities and procedures shall be aligned with the district's vision and goals for providing adequate facilities and programs that support student learning and well-being. When issuing debt, the district shall ensure that it:

- 1. Maintains accountability for the fiscal health of the district, including prudent management and transparency of the district's financing programs
- 2. Attains the best possible credit rating for each debt issue in order to reduce interest costs, within the context of preserving financial flexibility and meeting capital funding requirements
- 3. Takes all practical precautions and proactive measures to avoid any financial decision that will negatively impact current credit ratings on existing or future debt issues
- 4. Maintains effective communication with rating agencies and, as appropriate, credit enhancers such as bond insurers or other providers of credit or liquidity instruments in order to enhance the creditworthiness, liquidity, or marketability of the debt
- 5. Monitors the district's statutory debt limit in relation to assessed valuation within the district and the tax burden needed to meet long-term debt service requirements
- 6. When determining the timing of debt issuance, considers market conditions, cash flows associated with repayment, and the district's ability to expend the obtained funds in a timely, efficient, and economical manner consistent with federal tax laws
- 7. Determines the amortization (maturity) schedule which will fit best within the overall debt structure of the district at the time the new debt is issued
- 8. Considers the useful lives of assets funded by the debt issue, as well as repair and replacement costs of those assets to be incurred in the future
- 9. Preserves the availability of the district's general fund for operating purposes and other purposes that cannot be funded by the issuance of voter-approved debt
- 10. Meets the ongoing obligations and accountability requirements associated with the issuance and management of debt under state and federal tax and securities laws

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Authorized Purposes for the Issuance of Debt

The district may issue debt for any of the following purposes:

- 1. To pay for the cost of capital improvements, including acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, rehabilitating, replacing, improving, extending, enlarging, and/or equipping district facilities
- 2. To refund existing debt
- 3. To provide for cash flow needs

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(cf. 3100 - Budget)
(cf. 3110 - Transfer of Funds)
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Pursuant to Government Code 53854, general operating costs, including, but not limited to, items normally funded in the district's annual operating budget, shall not be financed from debt payable later than 15 months from the date of issuance. The district may deem it desirable to finance cash flow requirements under certain conditions so that available resources better match expenditures within a given fiscal year. To satisfy both state constitutional and statutory constraints, such cash flow borrowing shall be payable from taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts, and other moneys attributable to the fiscal year in which the debt is issued.

Authorized Types of Debt

The Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board potential financing method(s) that result in the highest benefit to the district, with the cost of staff and consultants considered. Potential financing sources may include:

- 1. Short-Term Debt
- a. Short-term debt, such as tax and revenue anticipation notes (TRANs), when necessary to allow the district to meet its cash flow requirements (Government Code 53850-53858)
- b. Bond anticipation notes (BANs) to provide interim financing for capital bond projects that will ultimately be paid from general obligation bonds (Education Code 15150)

 (Ref. F 2.3)

- c. Grant anticipation notes (GANs) to provide interim financing pending the receipt of grants and/or loans from the state or federal government that have been appropriated and committed to the district (Government Code 53859-53859.08)
- 2. Long-Term Debt
 - a. General obligation bonds for projects approved by voters (California Constitution, Article 13A, Section 1; Education Code 15100-15262, 15264-15276; Government Code 53506-53509.5)

(cf. 7214 - General Obligation Bonds)

b. Special tax bonds issued pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Government Code 53311-53368.3)

- 3. Lease financing, including certificates of participation (COPs)
 - a. Lease financing to fund the highest priority capital equipment purchases when pay-as-you-go financing is not feasible (Education Code 17450-17453.1)
 - b. Lease financing to fund facilities projects when there is insufficient time to obtain voter approval or in instances where obtaining voter approval is either not feasible or unavailable (Education Code 17400-17429)
- 4. Special financing programs or structures offered by the federal or state government, such as Qualified Zone Academy Bonds or other tax credit obligations or obligations that provide subsidized interest payments, when the use of such programs or structures is determined to result in sufficiently lower financing costs compared to traditional tax-exempt bonds and/or COPs
- 5. Temporary borrowing from other sources such as the County Treasurer

COPs, TRANs, revenue bonds, or any other non-voter approved debt instrument shall not be issued by the district in any fiscal year in which the district has a qualified or negative certification, unless the County Superintendent of Schools determines, pursuant to criteria established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, that the district's repayment of that indebtedness is probable. (Education Code 42133)

Relationship of Debt to District Facilities Program and Budget

Decisions regarding the issuance of debt for the purpose of financing capital improvement shall be aligned with current needs for acquisition, development, and/or improvement of district property and facilities as identified in the district's facilities master plan or other applicable needs assessment, the projected costs of those needs, schedules for the projects, and the expected resources.

The cost of debt issued for major capital repairs or replacements shall be evaluated against the potential cost of delaying such repairs and/or replacing such facilities.

When considering a debt issuance, the Board and the Superintendent or designee shall evaluate both the short-term and long-term implications of the debt issuance and additional operating costs associated with the new projects involved. Such evaluation may include, but is not limited to, the projected ratio of annual debt service to the tax burden on the district's taxpayers and the ratio of annual debt service secured by the general fund to general fund expenditures.

The district may enter into credit enhancement agreements such as municipal bond insurance, surety bonds, letters of credit, and lines of credit with commercial banks, municipal bond insurance companies, or other financial entities when their use is judged to lower borrowing costs, eliminate restrictive covenants, or have a net economic benefit to the financing.

Structure of Debt Issues

The district shall consider the overall impact of the current and future debt burden of the financing when determining the duration of the debt issue.

The district shall design the financing schedule and repayment of debt so as to take best advantage of market conditions, ensure cost effectiveness, provide flexibility, and, as practical, recapture or maximize its debt capacity for future use. Principal amortization will be structured to meet debt repayment, tax rate, and flexibility goals.

For new money debt issuances for capital improvements, the district shall size the debt issuance with the aim of funding capital projects as deemed appropriate by the Board, as long as the issuance is consistent with the overall financing plan, does not exceed the amount authorized by voters, and, unless a waiver is sought and received from the state, will not cause the district to exceed the limitation on debt issuances specified in the California Constitution or Education Code 15106.

To the extent practicable, the district shall also consider credit issues, market factors, and tax law when sizing the district's bond issuance. The sizing of refunding bonds shall be determined by the amount of money that will be required to cover the principal of, any accrued interest on, and any redemption premium for the debt to be paid on the call date and to cover appropriate financing costs.

Any general obligation bond issued by the district shall mature within 40 years of the issuance date or as otherwise required by law. (California Constitution, Article 16, Section 18; Government Code 53508.6)

The final maturity of equipment or real property lease obligations will be limited to the useful life of the assets to be financed but, with respect to a lease purchase of equipment, no longer than a period of ten years. (Education Code 17452)

Method of Sale

For the sale of any district-issued debt, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend the method of sale with the potential to achieve the lowest financing cost and/or to generate other benefits to the district. Potential methods of sale include:

- 1. A competitive bidding process through which the award is based on, among other factors, the lowest offered true interest cost
- 2. Negotiated sale, subject to approval by the district to ensure that interest costs are in accordance with comparable market interest rates
- 3. Private placement sale, when the financing can or must be structured for a single or limited number of purchasers or where the terms of the private placement are more beneficial to the district than either a negotiated or competitive sale

Investment of Proceeds

The district shall actively manage the proceeds of debt issued for public purposes in a manner that is consistent with state law governing the investment of public funds and with the permitted securities covenants of related financing documents executed by the district. Where applicable, the district's official investment policy and legal documents for a particular debt issuance shall govern specific methods of investment of bond-related proceeds. Preservation of principal shall be the primary goal of any investment strategy, followed by the availability of funds and then by return on investment.

With regard to general obligation bonds, the district shall invest new money bond proceeds in the county treasury pool as required by law. (Education Code 15146)

The management of public funds shall enable the district to respond to changes in markets or changes in payment or construction schedules so as to ensure liquidity and minimize risk.

Refunding/Restructuring

The district may consider refunding or restructuring outstanding debt if it will be financially advantageous or beneficial for debt repayment and/or structuring flexibility. When doing so, the district shall consider the maximization of the district's expected net savings over the life of the debt issuance and, when using a general obligation bond to refund an existing bond, shall ensure that the final maturity of the refunding bond is no longer than the final maturity of the existing bond.

Internal Controls

The Superintendent or designee shall establish internal control procedures to ensure that the proceeds of any debt issuance are directed to the intended use. Such procedures shall assist the district in maintaining the effectiveness and efficiency of operations, properly expending funds, reliably reporting debt incurred by the district and the use of the proceeds, complying with all laws and regulations, preventing fraud, and avoiding conflict of interest.

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The district shall be vigilant in using bond proceeds in accordance with the stated purposes at the time such debt was incurred as defined in the text of the voter-approved bond measure. (Government Code 53410)

When feasible, the district shall issue debt with a defined revenue source in order to preserve the use of the general fund for general operating purposes.

The district shall annually conduct a due diligence review to ensure its compliance with all ongoing obligations applicable to issuers of debt. Such a review may be conducted by general legal counsel or bond counsel. Any district personnel involved in conducting such reviews shall receive periodic training regarding their responsibilities.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district completes, as applicable, all performance and financial audits that may be required for any debt issued by the district, including disclosure requirements applicable to a particular transaction.

Records/Reports

At least 30 days prior to the sale of any debt issue, the Superintendent or designee shall submit a report of the proposed issuance to the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission (CDIAC). Such report shall include a self-certification that the district has adopted a policy concerning the use of debt that complies with law and that the contemplated debt issuance is consistent with that policy. (Government Code 8855)

On or before January 31 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall submit a report to the CDIAC regarding the debt authorized, the debt outstanding, and the use of proceeds of the issued debt for the period from July 1 to June 30. (Government Code 8855)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide initial and any annual or ongoing disclosures required by 17 CFR 240.10b-5 and 240.15c2-12 to the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board, investors, and other persons or entities entitled to disclosure, and shall ensure that the district's disclosure filings are updated as needed.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain transaction records of decisions made in connection with each debt issuance, including the selection of members of the financing team, the structuring of the financing, selection of credit enhancement products and providers, and selection of investment products. Each transaction file shall include the official transcript for the financing, interest rates and cost of issuance on the day when the debt was sold ("final number runs"), and a post-pricing summary of the debt issue. In addition, documentation evidencing the expenditure of proceeds, the use of debt-financed property by public and private entities, all sources of payment or security for the debt, and investment of proceeds shall be kept for as long as the debt is outstanding, plus the period ending three years after the financial payment date of the debt or the final payment date of any obligations or series of bonds issued to refund directly or indirectly all of any portion of the debt, whichever is later.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board regarding debts issued by the district, including information on actual and projected tax rates, an analysis of bonding capacity, ratings on the district's bonds, market update and refunding opportunities, new development for California bond financings, and the district's compliance with post-issuance requirements.

TOBACCO

The Board of Education recognizes the serious health risks presented by tobacco use and desires to ensure that, through adoption of consistent policies, District students are made aware of those risks and, to the extent possible, protected from them. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a coordinated school health system which includes a comprehensive behavioral health education component that teaches students the knowledge, skills, and attitudes they need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors, such as tobacco use.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide prevention, intervention, and cessation education, information, activities, and/or referrals to District students and shall ensure consistent enforcement of District policies prohibiting student possession and use of tobacco products.

Prohibition Against Tobacco Use

Students shall not possess, smoke, or use tobacco or any product containing tobacco or nicotine while on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of District employees. Prohibited products include, but are not limited to, eigarettes, eigars, miniature eigars, clove eigarettes, smokeless tobacco, snuff, chew packets, and betel. (Education Code 48900, 48901)

Students' possession or use of electronic eigarettes, electronic hookahs, and other vapor emitting devices, with or without nicotine content, that mimic the use of tobacco products is also prohibited.

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying of any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, tobacco, or plant product intended for inhalation, whether natural or synthetic, in any matter or form, and includes the use of an electronic smoking device that creates aerosol or vapor or of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking. (Business and Professions Code 22950.5; Education Code 48901)

TOBACCO (continued)

Tobacco products include: (Business and Professions Code 22950.5; Education Code 48901)

- 1. A product containing, made, or derived from tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any means, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, little cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, or snuff
- 2. An electronic device that delivers nicotine or other vaporized liquids to the person inhaling from the device, including, but not limited to, an electronic cigarette, cigar, pipe, or hookah
- 3. Any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product, whether or not sold separately

These prohibitions do not apply to a student's possession or use of his/her own prescription products. However, student possession or use of prescription products in school shall be subject to the District's policy and regulation for addressing the administration of medications on campus. (Education Code 48900)

The District shall provide developmentally appropriate tobacco-use prevention instruction for students at selected grade levels from K-12 pursuant to Education Code 51202. Such instruction shall be aligned with state content standards and the state curriculum framework for health education and with any requirements of state and/or federal grant programs in which the District participates.

Program Planning

The District's tobacco-use prevention and intervention program shall be based on an assessment of tobacco-use problems in District schools and the community, an examination of existing services and activities in the community, and a determination of high-risk student populations that are most in need of District services.

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with the local health department and county office of education in program planning and implementation. He/she may establish an advisory council including students, parents/guardians, District staff, representatives of the local health department and community organizations, law enforcement professionals, and/or others with demonstrated expertise in tobacco prevention and cessation.

He/she also shall annually report to the Board, and to the CDE if required, the data specified in Health and Safety Code 104450.

As a requirement of the Division of the State Architect (DSA), an Inspector of Record (IOR) must be contracted directly with the District to review the plans/specifications and oversee construction of public school facilities. The solar energy financier, Onyx Renewable Partners L.P., is responsible for the cost of the DSA inspection services under the Power Purchase Agreement which was signed on May 6, 2015, and Amendment No. 1 on August 24, 2016. All payment to the Inspection services will be reimbursed by SunEdison and its joint financial partner Onyx Renewable Partners L.P.

AGREEMENT WITH HEIDER INSPECTION GROUP

April 19, 2017

A certified testing laboratory is required on any construction project that requires Division of the State Architect (DSA) approval. The testing laboratory must be employed directly by the School District per Section 4-335 (b) of Title 24, Part 1, to perform geotechnical tests, structural tests, and inspection services as prescribed in the DSA Form SSS 103-1. The testing laboratory acts under the direction of the District, coordinates with the DSA Inspector in the field, and produces testing reports which shall be subject to DSA approval. The cost of the testing and inspection services will be paid for by the solar energy financier, Onyx Renewable Partners L.P., under the Power Purchase Agreement which was signed on May 6, 2015, and Amendment No. 1 on August 24, 2016.

Facilities Planning's proposal from the testing inspection firm which had been approved for the inspection of Phases 1, 2, and 3 of Solar Energy Projects for DSA testing and inspection services on the Phases 4, 5, and 6 of Solar Energy Project which include solar structures at twelve (12) school sites. After review with the solar project manager, Heider Inspection Group is recommended for the project.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve an agreement with Heider Inspection Group to provide soil tests, structural tests, and special inspection services for Phases 4, 5, and 6 of the District-wide Solar Energy Project for a not-to-exceed amount of \$140,116.00, to be temporarily paid from the General Fund and reimbursed by the financier, Onyx Renewable Partners L.P., at the end of the project.

RESOLUTION NO. 16-17-30 RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

RESOLUTION FOR EXEMPTION TO THE SEPARATION-FROM-SERVICE REQUIREMENT

April 19, 2017

Pursuant to Education Code sections 24214.5 and 26812, there is a 180 calendar day separation-from-service requirement for all retired CalSTRS members receiving retirement benefits, during which the postretirement compensation limit for the performance of retired member activities is zero dollars (\$0). Any compensation paid to the member during the first 180 calendar days after retirement will result in a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the benefit or annuity paid to the member or participant.

In response to concerns about the difficulty in hiring teachers, including substitute teachers, during the teacher shortage, the existing law provides for an exemption to the separation-from-service requirement imposed immediately after retirement if the retired CalSTRS member receiving retirement benefits is hired in a critically needed position and meets other eligibility criteria.

Qualifications for this exemption include that the retired CalSTRS member must:

- > Be at or above normal retirement age at the time the compensation is earned
- Not begin performing retired member activities until CalSTRS receives all required documentation.

The Board of Education must approve the retired CalSTRS member appointment by adopting a resolution in a public meeting before the retired CalSTRS member begins performing retired member activities under the exemption. Resolution 16-17-30 specifies that the District is in critical need of filling vacancies for teaching positions in elementary, secondary, special education, and substitute teachers due to a teacher shortage.

The District must submit the resolution specifying the retired member's position, and the completed Request for Separation-from-Service Requirement Exemption (SR 1897) Form to the District Financial Services of the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools, who will then forward it to CalSTRS. The Resolution and SR 1897 Form must be received by CalSTRS before the retired CalSTRS member begins performing service under the exemption, and all required documentation must be in compliance with the law. Any retired member who has received the Early Notification One-Time Incentive Plan or any retirement incentive is not eligible for this exemption.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution 16-17-30 authorizing exemption of the 180 calendar day separation-from-service requirement pursuant to Section 24214.5 and 26812 of the Education Code for retired CalSTRS members who are appointed to critically needed teaching positions and comply with all required documentation and regulations.

RESOLUTION NO. 16-17-30 BOARD OF EDUCATION RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION FOR EXEMPTION TO THE SEPARATION-FROM-SERVICE REQUIREMENT

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code section 24214.5 and 26812, there is a 180 calendar day separation-from-service requirement for all retired CalSTRS members and participants; and,

WHEREAS, all retired CalSTRS members and participants are subject to a restriction if they perform retired member activities as defined by section 22164.5 of the Education Code or retired participant activities as defined by section 26135.7 of the Education Code, during the first 180 calendar days after their most recent retirement; and,

WHEREAS, if the retired CalSTRS member or participant performed retired member or participant activities during this period, CalSTRS will reduce his or her retirement benefit or annuity one dollar for each dollar earned for performing retired member or participant activities during the 180-day period; and,

WHEREAS, there is an exemption from the 180 calendar day separation-from-service requirement for a member or participant who retires for service and is at or above normal retirement age; and,

WHEREAS, in order to qualify for this narrow exemption, the employer must appoint the retired member or participant to a critically needed position that has been approved by the Board of Education in a public meeting as reflected in a resolution; and,

WHEREAS, this approval by the Board of Education in a public meeting as reflected in a resolution must be finalized and communicated to CalSTRS before the member or participant commences to perform retired member or participant activities; and,

WHEREAS, the Superintendent must complete the Request for Separation-from-Service Requirement Exemption form, which must be submitted to CalSTRS and received by CalSTRS before the member or participant commences to perform retired member or participant activities,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does provide public notice that the District is in critical need of teaching positions for Elementary, Secondary, Special Education, and Substitute Teachers *due to the teacher shortage*;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board wishes to meet this critical need by hiring *Elementary, Secondary, Special Education, and Substitute Teachers,* a member or participant who retired for service less than 180 days ago or who will retire;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this appointment is needed to fill this critical need before the 180 calendar day separation-from-service requirement is fulfilled;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this member or participant did not receive a retirement incentive or any financial inducement to retire from any public employer;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the retired member's or participant's termination of employment is not the basis for the need to acquire his or her services:

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the earnings for retired member activities during the 180 calendar days will still be subject to the annual postretirement earnings limit for the Defined Benefit Program;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this member or participant will not commence to perform retired member or participant activities before this approval is authorized by the Board of Education in a public meeting as reflected in a resolution and received by CalSTRS;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this member or participant will not commence to perform retired member or participant activities before the *Superintendent* completes the *Request for Separation-from-Service Requirement Exemption* form and this is transmitted to and received by CalSTRS.
