#### **EDUCATION FOR AMERICAN INDIAN STUDENTS (New)**

The Governing Board recognizes that American Indian students may have unique cultural, language, and educational needs that may be addressed by increasing student knowledge about American Indian history, including the history and culture of local tribes, and by providing American Indian students with access to education and other services necessary for such students to meet the same challenging academic standards as other students.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide all students with culturally relevant curricula related to local American Indian tribes and implement strategies necessary for the improvement of the academic achievement of American Indian students.

In order to discuss, gain a shared understanding of, and develop curriculum for use within the District, and to identify the extent and nature of any achievement gaps between American Indian students and other District students, and strategies to address any such gaps, the District may form a California Indian Education Task Force with tribes local to the region. Participants in the task force meetings may consider issues of mutual concern, which include: (Education Code 33391)

- Developing a thorough, shared understanding of accurate, high-quality curricular materials about the history, culture, and government of local tribes, and developing such materials for use within the District that include tribal experiences and perspectives
- 2. Developing a shared understanding of proper or improper instructional materials when these materials use depictions of Native Americans
- 3. Encouraging the adoption of the curriculum developed by the California Indian Education Task Force
- 4. Identifying the extent and nature of any achievement gap between American Indian students and other students, and strategies necessary to close it

If formed, the California Indian Education Task Force shall, within one year and thereafter annually, submit a report to the California Department of Education on the findings, including progress of work on Items #1-4, above. (Education Code 33391)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify American Indian students most at risk of not meeting state academic standards and provide to such students the needed support(s), including making referrals, as appropriate, for special education services or services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, or other school-based services such as counseling and health services, supplemental instruction, before- or after- school services, and summer learning programs.

Suspension, expulsion, assignment to a supervised suspension classroom, or involuntary transfer to a continuation school of an American Indian student shall be in accordance with law and as specified in Administrative Regulation 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process, 5144.2 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process (Students with Disabilities), and 6184 - Continuation Education.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide programs to facilitate the successful transition of American Indian students to post-secondary education and employment, which may include college and career fairs in accordance with Labor Code 3074.2, mentorship programs, and counseling services.

As needed, the Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development to teachers and other school staff to assist them in understanding and responding to the unique needs of American Indian students.

At least annually, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board on the outcomes of American Indian students including, but not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention by grade level, graduation rates, and suspension/expulsion rates.

#### Title VI Indian Education Program

With the assistance of federal Title VI funding for the education of children from federally recognized tribes, the District shall offer programs and activities to meet the unique cultural, language, and educational needs of American Indian students, as defined in 20 USC 7491. Program objectives and outcomes shall be based on state academic standards. (20 USC 7424)

In developing, implementing, and evaluating Title VI programs and activities, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with and involve family members of American Indian students and other community representatives. (20 USC 7424)

The District shall establish a committee that is composed of, and selected by, family members of American Indian students, representatives of tribes on tribal lands located within 50 miles of any District school that serves any children of the tribes, teachers, and, if appropriate, American Indian students enrolled in secondary schools in the District. The majority of the committee shall be family members of American Indian students. The committee shall participate in program development and provide written approval for the program. (20 USC 7424)

The District's Title VI program for American Indian education may include any of the following services and activities: (20 USC 7425)

- 1. Activities that support Native American language programs and Native American language restoration programs, which may be taught by traditional leaders
- 2. Culturally related activities that support the District's program
- 3. Early childhood and family programs that emphasize school readiness

- 4. Enrichment programs that focus on problem-solving and cognitive skills development and directly support the attainment of state academic standards
- 5. Integrated educational services in combination with other programs that meet the needs of American Indian students and their families, including programs that promote family involvement in school activities and increase student achievement
- 6. Career preparation activities that enable American Indian students to participate in career technical education programs, including programs for mentoring and apprenticeship
- 7. Activities to educate individuals so as to prevent violence, suicide, and substance abuse
- 8. The acquisition of equipment that is essential to achieve program goals
- 9. Activities that promote the incorporation of culturally responsive teaching and learning strategies into the District's educational program
- 10. Family literacy services
- 11. Activities that recognize and support the unique cultural and educational needs of American Indian students, and incorporate appropriately qualified tribal elders and seniors
- 12. Dropout prevention strategies for American Indian students
- 13. Strategies to meet the educational needs of American Indian students in correctional facilities, including such strategies that support American Indian students who are transitioning from such facilities to schools served by the District

Any federal funds received to support American Indian education programs shall be used to supplement, not supplant, state or local funds allocated for such purposes. (20 USC 7424)

Program funds may be used to support a Title I schoolwide program pursuant to 20 USC 6314 if approved by the committee established pursuant to 20 USC 7424, provided that the schoolwide program is consistent with the purpose of American Indian education programs and the District's application identifies how the use of such funds in a schoolwide program will produce benefits to American Indian students that would not be achieved if not used in a schoolwide program. (20 USC 7424)

As needed, professional development shall be provided to teachers and other school staff to assist them in working with American Indian students and carrying out Title VI programs. (20 USC 7424)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of the information establishing the status of each student as an American Indian student eligible for assistance through the federal American Indian education program. (20 USC 7427)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically assess the progress of all American Indian students, including American Indian students who do not participate in programs funded through Title VI, in meeting program goals and objectives. Assessment results shall be provided to the Board, the committee established pursuant to 20 USC 7424, tribes whose children are served by the District, and the community. (20 USC 7424)

#### Food Service/Child Nutrition Program

The Board of Education recognizes that adequate, nourishing food is essential to student health **and well-being**, development, and ability to learn. The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to increase students' access to **and participation in** the District's food service programs and to maximize their participation in available **maintain fiscal integrity of the** programs **in accordance with law**.

Foods and beverages available through the District's food service program shall:

1. Be carefully selected so as to contribute to students' nutritional well-being and the prevention of disease

2. Meet or exceed nutrition standards specified in law and administrative regulation

- 3. Be prepared in ways that will appeal to students, retain nutritive quality, and foster lifelong healthful eating habits
- 4. Be served in age-appropriate portions
- 5. Be available to students who meet federal eligibility criteria at no cost or at reduced prices, and to other students at reasonable prices
- 5. Be provided at no cost to students who request a meal

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall communicate information related to the District's food service programs to the public through available means including, but not limited to the District's website, social media, flyers, and school publications

The District's food service program shall give priority to serving unprocessed foods and fresh fruits and vegetables.

District schools are encouraged to establish school gardens and/or farm-to-school projects to increase the availability of safe, fresh, seasonal fruits and vegetables for school meals and to support the District's nutrition education program.

BP 3550(b)

To the extent possible, the school meal program shall be coordinated with the nutrition education program, instructional program for teachers, families and food service employees, available community resources, and other related District programs.

To encourage student participation in school meal programs, schools may offer multiple choices of food items within a meal service; provided all food items meet nutrition standards and all students are given an opportunity to select any food item.

The Superintendent or designee may invite students and <del>parents/guardians</del> **families** to participate in the selection of foods of good nutritional quality for school menus.

The Board desires to provide students with **Students shall be allowed** adequate time and space to eat meals. To the extent possible, school, recess, and transportation schedules shall be designed to encourage **promote** participation in school meal programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically review the adequacy of school cafeterias and facilities for cafeteria eating and food preparation and consumption.

In accordance with law, the Superintendent or designee shall develop and maintain a food safety program in order to reduce the risk of food-borne hazards at each step of the food preparation process, from receiving to and services process.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on student participation in the District's nutrition programs and the extent to which the District's food services program meets state and federal nutrition standards for foods and beverages. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall provide all necessary and available documentation required for the Administrative Review conducted by the California Department of Education (CDE) to ensure the food service program's compliance with federal requirements related to nutrition standards, meal patterns, provision of drinking water, school meal environment, food safety, and other areas as required by the CDE.

# **Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund**

The Board of Education intends that school **food** nutrition services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. To iensure **program** quality and increase cost effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall centralize and direct the purchasing of food and supplies, the planning of menus, and the auditing of all **food** nutrition services accounts for the District.

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all food nutrition services personnel administrators possess the qualifications and receive ongoing professional development related to the effective management and implementation of the District's nutrition services program: required by 7 CFR 210.30 and California Department of Education (CDE) standards.

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At least once each year, **food** nutrition services administrators, other appropriate personnel who conduct or oversee administrative procedures, and other **food** nutrition services personnel shall receive training provided by California Department of Education (CDE). (42 USC 1776)

#### **Meal Sales**

Any student who requests a meal shall be served a nutritionally adequate breakfast and lunch free of charge, each school day. (Education Code 49501.5)

As permitted by law, additional or second meals, adult meals, and other nonprogram foods, such as smart snack compliant food and beverages sold in vending machines, may be sold to students. (Education Code 38082, 49501.5)

Meals may be sold to district employees, Board members, and employees or members of the fund or association maintaining the cafeteria. (Education Code 38082)

#### **Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund**

In addition, meals may be sold to nonstudents, including parents/guardians, volunteers, students' siblings, or other individuals, who are authorized by the Superintendent or designee to be on campus. Any meals served to nonstudents shall not be subsidized by federal or state reimbursements, food service revenues, or U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) foods.

Meal prices, as recommended by the Superintendent or designee and approved by the Board, shall be based on the costs of providing food services and consistent with Education Code 38084 and 42 USC 1760.

Students who are enrolled in the free or reduced price meal program shall receive meals free of charge or at a reduced price in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Meals may be served to nonstudents, including parents/guardians, volunteers, students' siblings, or other individuals, who are on campus for a legitimate purpose. Any meals served to nonstudents shall not be subsidized by federal or state reimbursements, food service revenues, or U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) foods:

The Superintendent or designee shall establish strategies and procedures for the collection of meal payments. Such procedures shall conform with 2 CFR 200.426 and any applicable CDE guidance. The Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate these procedures to students and parents/guardians, and shall make this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation available to the public pursuant to Education Code 49557.5.

#### Cafeteria Fund and Account

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a Cafeteria Fund independent of the District's General Fund.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that state and federal funds provided through school meal programs are allocated only for purposes related to the operation or improvement of **food** nutrition services and **for** reasonable and necessary indirect program costs as allowed by law.

The wages, salaries, and benefits of **food** nutrition services employees shall be paid from the District's General **Cafeteria Fund**. At any time, the Board may order reimbursement from the District's Cafeteria Fund for these payments in amounts prescribed by the Board and not exceeding the costs actually incurred. (Education Code 38103)

#### **Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund**

#### **Contracts with Outside Services**

With Board approval, the District may enter into a contract for food service consulting services or management services in one or more District schools. (Education Code 45103.5; 42 USC 1758; 7 CFR 210.16)

# **Procurement of Foods, Equipment and Supplies**

To the maximum extent practicable, foods purchased for use in school meals by the District or by any entity purchasing food on its behalf shall be domestic commodities or products. Domestic commodity or product means an agricultural commodity that is produced in the United States and a food product that is processed in the United States substantially using agricultural commodities that are produced in the United States. (42 USC 1760; 7 CFR 210.21)

When soliciting for bids and contracts for the purchase of an agricultural food product, the district shall specify in the solicitation that only the purchase of agricultural food products grown, packed, or processed domestically is authorized, unless a specific exception applies. A nondomestic food product may be purchased for use in the District's food service program only as a last resort when the product is not produced or manufactured in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available quantities of a satisfactory quality, the quality of the domestic product is inferior to the quality of the nondomestic product, or the bid or price of the nondomestic product is more than 25 percent lower than the bid or price of the domestic product. In such cases, the Superintendent or designee shall retain documentation justifying the use of the exception for three years from the date of purchase. (Food and Agriculture Code 58596.3)

Furthermore, the District shall accept a bid or price for an agricultural food product grown in California before accepting a bid or price for a domestic agricultural food product that is grown outside the state, if the quality of the California-grown product is comparable and the bid or price does not exceed the lowest bid or price for domestic product produced outside the state. (Food and Agriculture Code 58595)

Bid solicitations and awards for purchases of equipment, materials, or supplies in support of the District's child nutrition program, or for contracts awarded pursuant to Public Contract Code 2000, shall be consistent with the federal procurement standards in 2 CFR 200.318-200.326. Awards shall be let to the most responsive and responsible party. Price shall be the primary consideration, but not the only determining factor, in making such an award. (Public Contract Code 2011)

# **Program Monitoring and Evaluation**

The Superintendent or designee shall present to the Board, at least annually, financial reports regarding revenues and expenditures related to the nutrition services program.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide all necessary documentation required for the Administrative Review conducted by the CDE to ensure compliance of the District's **food** nutrition service program with federal requirements. related to maintenance of the nonprofit school nutrition services account, paid lunch equity, revenue from nonprogram goods, indirect costs, and USDA foods.

#### Free And Reduced Price Meals

The Board of Education recognizes that adequate nutrition is essential to the development, health **and well-being**, and learning of all students. The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate and encourage the participation of **all** students from low income families in the District's food service program.

Each school day, 7the District shall provide at least one free of charge a nutritionally adequate meal each school day, free of charge or at a reduced price, breakfast and lunch for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. any student who requests a meal. (Education Code 49550, 49552 49501.5)

To provide optimal nutrition and ensure that schools receive maximum federal meal reimbursement, the Superintendent or designee shall assess the eligibility of district schools to operate a federal universal meal service provision, such as Provision 2 or the Community Eligibility Provision, pursuant to 42 USC 1759a.

The Superintendent or designee shall submit an application to operate a federal universal meal provision to the California Department of Education (CDE) on behalf of any district school that meets the definition of a "high poverty school." (Education Code 4956.3)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that meals provided through the free and reduced price meals served under the school nutrition program meet applicable state and/or federal nutritional standards in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Schools participating in the Special Milk Program pursuant to 42 USC 1772 shall provide milk at no charge to students who meet federal eligibility criteria for free and reduced price meals.

The Board shall approve, and shall submit to the California Department of Education CDE for approval, a plan that ensures that students eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals and milk are not treated differently from other students: and that meets other requirements specified in (Education Code 49557)

Confidentiality/Release of Records

All applications and records related to eligibility for the free and reduced-price meals program shall be confidential and may not be released **disclosed** except as provided by law and authorized by the Board or pursuant to a court order. (Education Code 49558)

The Board authorizes designated employees to use individual records pertaining to student an individual student's eligibility for the free and reduced-price meals program for the following purposes of: (Education Code 49558)

1. Disaggregation of academic achievement data

- 2. In any school identified as a Title I program improvement school pursuant to 20 USC 6316, identification of students eligible for school choice and supplemental educational services
- 2. Identification of students eligible for services under the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act pursuant to 20 USC 6301-6576
- 3. Facilitation of targeted educational services and supports to individual students based on the local control accountability plan

If a student transfers from the District to another district, charter school, county office of education program, or private school, the Superintendent or designee may share the student's meal eligibility information to the other educational agency to assist in the continuation of the student's meal benefits. that other educational agency in ensuring that the student continues to receive school meals.

The Superintendent or designee may release the name and eligibility status of a student participating in the free or reduced-price meal program to another school district, charter school, or county office of education that is serving a student living in the same household for purposes related to program eligibility and data used in local control funding formula **(LCFF)** calculations. (Education Code 49558)

The Superintendent or designee may release the name and eligibility status of a student participating in the free or reduced-price meal program to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for purposes of determining allocations under the <del>local control funding formula LCFF</del> and for assessing accountability of the funding. (Education Code 49558)

The Superintendent or designee may release of information on the school lunch program application to the local agency that determines eligibility for participation in the Medi-Cal program if the student has been approved for free meals or, if included in the agreement with the local agency, for reduced-price meals. He/she—The Superintendent or designee also may release information on the school lunch program application to the local agency that determines eligibility for CalFresh another nutrition assistance program authorized under 7 CFR 210.1 if the student has been approved for free or reduced-price meals. Information may be released for these purposes only if the student's parent/guardian consents to the sharing of information and the District has entered into a memorandum of understanding with the local agency which, at a minimum, includes the roles and responsibilities of the District and the local agency and the process for sharing the information. After sharing information with the local agency for purposes of determining eligibility for that program, no further information shall be shared unless otherwise authorized by law. (Education Code 49557.2, 49557.3, 49558)

# Certification

The Board of Education recognizes that the District's ability to provide a high-quality educational program is dependent upon the employment of certificated staff who are adequately prepared and have demonstrated proficiency in basic skills and **competency** in the subject matter to be taught. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that persons employed to fill positions requiring certification qualifications possess the appropriate credential, permit, or other certification document from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) and fulfill any additional state, federal, or district requirements for the position.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide assistance and support to teachers holding preliminary credentials to enable them to meet the qualifications required for the clear credential.

## Priorities for Hiring Based on Unavailability of Credentialed Teacher

The Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to recruit a fully prepared teacher for each assignment. Whenever a teacher with a clear or preliminary credential is not available, the Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to recruit an individual for the assignment in the following order: (Education Code 44225.7)

- 1. A candidate who enrolls in an approved intern program in the region of the District and possesses an intern credential
- 2. A candidate who is scheduled to complete preliminary credential requirements within six months and who holds is granted a provisional internship permit (PIP) or short-term staff permit issued by the CTC

The Board shall approve, as an action item take action to approve, at an public open Board meeting, a notice of its intent to employ a PIP applicant for a specific position. (5 CCR 80021.1)

3. An individual who holds an emergency permit or for whom a has been granted a credential waiver has been granted by the CTC

**Annually, the Board shall, Pp**rior to requesting that the CTC issue an emergency permit pursuant to item #3 above or a limited assignment permit, which allows a fully credentialed teacher to teach outside of his/her area of certification while working toward an added or supplementary authorization, the Board shall annually approve a Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators. The Declaration of Need shall be approved by the Board as an action item at a regularly scheduled public **open** Board meeting, with the entire Declaration of Need being included in the Board agenda. (Education Code 44225, 44225.7; 5 CCR 80023.2, 80026, 80027, 80027.1)

The Declaration of Need shall certify that there is an insufficient number of certificated persons who meet the **D**istrict's specified employment criteria for the position(s); and that the **D**istrict has made reasonable efforts to recruit individuals who meet the qualifications specified in items #1-2 above. The Declaration of Need shall also indicate the number and type of emergency permits **and limited assigned permits** that the **D**istrict estimates it will need during the valid period of the Declaration of Need, based on the previous year's actual needs and projections of enrollment. **It shall also specify each subject to be listed on the General Education Limited Assignment Single Subject Teaching Permits and the target language on Emergency Bilingual Permits.** Whenever the actual number of permits needed exceeds the estimate by 10 percent, the Board shall revise and resubmit the Declaration of Need. (5 CCR 80026)

Whenever it is necessary to employ noncredentialed teachers to fill a position requiring certification qualifications, the Superintendent or designee shall provide support and guidance in accordance with law to ensure the quality of the instructional program.

#### National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Certification

The Board of Education encourages district teachers to voluntarily complete the requirements for the advanced certification awarded by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall promote a career continuum that includes participation of District teachers in professional learning that supports their completion of advanced certification awarded by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS). The Superintendent or designee may coordinate a cohort of teachers through school or District programs or other available networks.

The Superintendent or designee shall inform all teachers about the program and how to acquire the necessary application and information materials. In accordance with the collective bargaining agreement and the district budget, the Superintendent or designee may provide release time, fee support, a stipend upon completion, or other support to teachers participating in the program.

With Board approval and funding, and consistent with the collective bargaining agreement and applicable law, the Superintendent may provide an incentive program for teacher participation in NBPTS certification, which may include:

- 1. Defraying, subsidizing, or reimbursing the registration, certification, or maintenance fees for NBPTS certification
- Providing bonuses, step increases, or differential pay for teachers who
  maintain their certification and continue to teach in the District, with priority
  given to teachers at Title I schools and schools serving a majority of
  low-income students
- 3. Providing substitute teachers to provide release time for participating teachers
- 4. Providing stipends for teacher participation that match other professional development stipends
- 5. Compensating mentor teachers who support other teachers' professional learning aligned to NBPTS standards

#### Professional Parental Notifications

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of each student attending a school receiving Title I funds that they may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teacher including, but not limited to, whether the teacher: (20 USC 6312)

- 1. Has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction
- 2. Is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived
- 3. Is teaching in the field of discipline of his/her certification

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians in a timely manner whenever their child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who does not meet applicable state certification or licensure requirements at the grade level and subject area to which the teacher has been assigned. (20 USC 6312)

#### **BACKGROUND**:

ProSolve's Quest was founded in 2012 to create a new type of learning environment; one that challenged the status quo, and positioned students as problem-solvers and lifelong learners. The Quest Summer Learning Curriculum has been used in over five hundred districts in more than twelve (12) countries around the world. Districts that have used the curriculum report an increase in summer school engagement and positive student feedback.

#### **REASONING:**

ProSolve is congruent with our District's focus on supporting our students with literacy. It is also congruent with Strategy I of our District's Strategic Plan, "We will provide a rigorous and relevant learning experience to ensure each student's holistic development." #### APPROVE A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) BETWEEN THE SAN-BERNARDINO COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT - ADULT SCHOOL

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The San Bernardino County Department of Health will provide health and field experience to students enrolled in the Community Healthcare class at Rialto Adult School. San Bernardino County Department of Health will reserve participation slots for students taking part in health experiences, including daily administrative responsibilities, lectures, storage of instructional material, and any pertinent items needed.

#### **REASONING:**

Rialto Adult School is seeking to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) agreement with the San Bernardino County Department of Health so that students from the adult school can have access to their facilities, engage in internship, and training. This partnership will allow our students the opportunity to complete educational requirements of internship hours required in the Community Healthcare Worker Class.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

#### APPROVE AN AGREEMENT WITH PUBLIC ECONOMICS, INC.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The District is in need of building a new central kitchen facility to continue exemplary Child Nutrition program offered at Rialto Unified School District. In order to build this facility, the District needs to identify financing options. The first step to identifying financing alternative is to secure a repayment source outside the Unrestricted General Fund. The District believes Community Redevelopment Agency (RDA) Funds may be a source of funding for the repayment of this future liability. The District currently receives annual RDA Revenue from eight (8) distinct Redevelopment Project Areas ("Project Areas") within the cities of Rialto, Colton, and the County of San Bernardino. Each of these Project Areas has unique terms and parameters.

#### **REASONING:**

The District has been able to confirm through a preliminary revenue analysis that the Community Redevelopment Agency Funds allocated to the District has sufficient future revenue to secure a future liability. The next step in the process would be to identify if any of the Redevelopment Project Area agreements have clauses that would apply "subordination" to the District future revenue. A subordination clause establishes an order of payment. This is important to identify as it can affect the pass-through revenue received by the District if outstanding bond issues would need to be paid before any pass-through payments are made to the District.

Identifying the Redevelopment Project Areas with subordination clauses will allow the District to prepare a better-informed financing plan.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve an agreement with Public Economics, Inc. to perform an in-depth research and analysis of Redevelopment Project Area agreements, at a cost not-to-exceed \$35,448.00 and to be paid from Fund 25 - Capital Facilities.

## AMENDMENT NO. 4 TO THE AGREEMENT WITH HMC ARCHITECTS FOR EXTENDED ARCHITECTURAL/ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR THE SPECIAL EDUCATION RENOVATION PROJECT AT THE DISTRICT OFFICE

#### **BACKGROUND:**

On March 25, 2020, the Board of Education approved an agreement with HMC to provide architectural/engineering services for the Special Education Renovation Project at the District office. The original approved agreement amount was \$276,483.00. The Board of Education also approved Amendments No. 1 and No. 2 to extend the term of the agreement with no fiscal impact to the original agreement amount. On August 10, 2022, the Board of Education approved Amendment No. 3 in the amount of \$9,775.00 (plus \$1,500.00 for reimbursable expenses) for unforeseen structural conditions affecting Building C, which required revisions to the plan details for the wall and roof penetrations for the mechanical units, as well as providing new load calculations for a revised contract amount of \$287,758.00.

#### **REASONING:**

During the course of construction, the project experienced many delays due to various reasons. Amendment No. 4 for HMC Architects is due to the extended architectural and construction administration services rendered beyond the original project completion date from November 1, 2022, to November 1, 2023. Amendment No. 4 extends the contract duration until December 31, 2023, and increases the contract in the amount of \$97,692.50 for a total revised contract amount of \$385,450.50.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve Amendment No. 4 to the agreement with HMC Architects for extended architectural/engineering services for the Special Education Renovation Project at the District office in the amount of \$97,692.50 for a total revised contract amount of \$385,450.50, and extend the contract duration through December 31, 2023, and to be paid from Fund 40—Special Reserve Capital Outlay Projects.

### APPROVE A RENEWAL AGREEMENT WITH THE CENTER FOR CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE TEACHING AND LEARNING WITH DR. SHARROKY HOLLIE

#### **BACKGROUND**:

The Center for Culturally Responsive Teaching and Learning, with Dr. Sharroky Hollie, will partner with the Rialto Unified School District to provide professional learning and classroom coaching centered on the principles of Culturally and Linguistically Responsive (CLR) Teaching and Learning in the classroom. This CLR Instructional Support and Development (coaching) aims to build knowledge and create the context for addressing the needs of underserved students in sociolinguistic relativity as well as promote a focus on effective instructional strategies that validate and affirm underserved students across content areas and grade levels.

#### **REASONING**:

Culturally and Linguistically Responsive Teaching and Learning: Foundation Awareness ties directly to Rialto Unified School District's Strategic Plan, Strategy I, "We will provide rigorous and relevant learning experiences to ensure each student's holistic development." Teachers need Culturally and Linguistically Responsive Teaching understanding and strategies to ensure that students remain engaged in their learning and feel validated in their school experiences. This initiative reflects the commitment made in Resolution No. 19-20-65, Declaring Racism a Public Health Crisis, by addressing racial inequity and implicit bias within our current educational structures. In 2022-2023 25 teachers participated in Cohort 1 Instructional Support and Development (ISD) Cycle and 89% stated that as a result of ISD, they know how to better intentionally and purposefully plan CLR activities that validate and affirm student's cultural behaviors, as well as build and bridge towards school behaviors. Out of the 25 teachers that participated, 92% reported that there was a significant change in their knowledge of cultural behaviors.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

To provide the Culturally and Linguistically Responsive (CLR) Instructional Support and Development for eight (8) schools, effective November 16, 2023 through June 30, 2024, at a cost not-to-exceed \$72,000.00, and to be paid from the General Fund.

# RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING ITS OFFICIAL INTENT TO REIMBURSE PROJECT EXPENDITURES WITH PROCEEDS OF CERTIFICATES OF PARTICIPATION AND RELATED ACTIONS

**WHEREAS**, the Rialto Unified School District (the "District") intends to issue (or cause to be issued) and sell certificates of participation or other obligations (the "Securities") in order to finance a central kitchen facility project (collectively, the "Project");

**WHEREAS**, beginning the 60-day period prior to the date hereof, the District has paid or incurred, or expects to pay or incur, costs with respect to the Project, including, but not limited to, site acquisition, design and construction of the Project, prior to the issuance of the Securities in order to finance the Project;

**WHEREAS**, the District also may have paid or incurred certain "preliminary expenditures" in connection with the Project, which term includes architectural, engineering, surveying, soil testing, reimbursement bond issuance, and similar costs that are incurred prior to commencement of acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation of a project, other than land acquisition, site preparation, and similar costs incident to commencement of construction:

**WHEREAS**, in order to reimburse itself for the payment, or pay unpaid costs, of the Project, the District anticipates it will issue debt obligations in an estimated amount not expected to exceed \$55,000,000 of the Securities for the purpose of financing costs of the Project;

**WHEREAS**, proceeds of such debt obligations (including the Securities) will be allocated to reimbursement expenditures no later than 18 months after the later of (i) the date the cost is paid, or (ii) the date the Project (or each component thereof) is placed in service or abandoned (but in no event more than three years after the cost is paid);

**WHEREAS**, the District will serve as the issuer of the Securities and is the applicable authorized entity to declare its reasonable official intent to reimburse prior expenditures for the Project with proceeds of indebtedness;

**WHEREAS**, Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations requires the District to declare its reasonable official intent to reimburse prior expenditures for the Project with proceeds of indebtedness; and

**WHEREAS**, the District wishes to declare its official intent to use proceeds of indebtedness (such as the Securities) to reimburse Project expenditures paid before its obligations are issued and to finance Project costs on a long-term basis with the proceeds of such indebtedness;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Education of the Rialto Unified School District, as follows:

**Section 1.** All of the recitals herein contained are true and correct and the Board of Education (the "Board") so finds.

<u>Section 2.</u> This Resolution is adopted by the Board solely for purposes of establishing compliance with the requirements of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Unless otherwise defined, terms used herein shall have the meaning set forth in the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and in Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. This Resolution does not bind the District to make any expenditure, incur any indebtedness, or proceed with the Project.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers, employees and agents of the District are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the actions herein authorized and otherwise to carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution.

**Section 4.** All actions heretofore taken by the officers, employees and agents of the District with respect to the actions set forth above are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified.

**Section 5.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

## RESOLUTION NO. 23-24-29 ANNUAL DEVELOPER FEE REPORT AND ANNUAL ACCOUNTING OF DEVELOPER FEES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023

**WHEREAS**, the Rialto Unified School District ("District") has received and expended Reportable Fees in connection with school facilities ("School Facilities") of the District for new development and these funds have been deposited in a capital facilities account as provided by Section 66006(a) of the Government Code; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with Section 66006(a) of the Government Code, the District has established and maintained a separate capital facilities account and maintained such capital facilities account in a manner to avoid any commingling of the Reportable Fees with other revenues and funds of the District, except for temporary investments, and has expended those Reportable Fees collected for the sole purpose for which they were collected; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 66006(b)(1) of the Government Code provides that the District shall make available to the public within one hundred eighty (180) days after the last day of each fiscal year the following information in the form of a Reportable Fees Report:

- (A) A brief description of the type of Reportable Fees in the account
- (B) The amount of the Reportable Fees
- (C) The beginning and ending balance of the account
- (D) The amount of the Reportable Fees collected and the interest earned
- (E) An identification of each project ("Project") of the District on which Reportable Fees were expended and the amount of the expenditures on each Project, including the total percentage of the cost of the Project that was funded with Reportable Fees
- (F) An identification of an approximate date by which the construction of a Project will commence if the District determines that sufficient funds have been collected to complete financing on an incomplete Project, as identified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 66001, and the Project remains incomplete
- (G) A description of each interfund transfer or loan made from the account, including the Project on which the transferred or loaned Reportable Fees will be expended, and, in the case of an interfund loan, the date on which the loan will be repaid, and the rate of interest that the account or fund will receive on the loan
- (H) The amount of refunds made pursuant to subdivision (e) of Section 66001 and any allocations pursuant to subdivision (f) of Section 66001; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 66001 (d) of the Government Code provides that for the fifth fiscal year following the first deposit into the account, and every five years thereafter, the District shall make all of the following findings with respect to that portion of the account remaining unexpended, whether committed or uncommitted:

- (1) Identification of the purpose to which the Reportable Fees are to be applied
- (2) Demonstration of a reasonable relationship between the Reportable Fees and the purpose for which they are charged
- (3) Identification of all sources and amounts of funding anticipated to complete financing of the K-12 school facilities of the District
- (4) Designation of the approximate dates on which the funding referred to in paragraph (3) is expected to be deposited into the appropriate account; and

**WHEREAS**, when findings are required by Section 66001(d) of the Government Code, they shall be made in connection with the information required by Section 66006 of the Government Code; and

WHEREAS, Section 66006(b)(2) of the Government Code requires the Board of Education ("Board") to review the information made available to the public at a regularly scheduled public meeting and any other relevant information including, but not limited to, that certain Reportable Fees Report prepared for the District entitled "Annual Developer Fee Report" Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance for the Fiscal Year 2022-2023, in compliance with Government Code Sections 66001 and 66006, not less than fifteen (15) days after this Reportable Fees Report is made available to the public; and

WHEREAS, the District has complied with all of the foregoing provisions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, determined, and ordered as follows:

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 23-24-32**

# RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF VANS, TRUCKS AND/OR SIMILAR CARGO VEHICLES, AND RELATED ACTIONS

**WHEREAS**, in September of 2021, the District initiated the process of ordering vehicles to replace seven existing work trucks used by Maintenance and Operation staff and other support staff in connection with routine maintenance and repair of District facilities and other District purposes; and

**WHEREAS**, the District initiated the vehicle replacement process because, at the time, the District's existing fleet was aged and in a deteriorated condition, including, among other things, vehicles with failing air conditioning systems, inability to handle required cargo weights, and frequent mechanical breakdowns necessitating costly repairs; and

**WHEREAS**, the District initially attempted to procure the replacement vehicles, as authorized by California law, through an intergovernmental contract with the California State Department of General Services ("DGS"), which DGS had awarded to Downtown Ford Sales of Sacramento ("Downtown Ford"); and

**WHEREAS**, in September of 2021, the District placed an order with Downtown Ford for seven trucks, but, due to manufacturer delivery issues, Downtown Ford subsequently deferred delivery of the District's order to the next production year (i.e., the 2022 production year); and

WHEREAS, because the District still had not received the vehicles it previously had ordered from Downtown Ford, the District again, in August of 2022, issued new purchase orders for seven trucks and included an additional order for five cargo vehicles used in the transportation of mail, information technology equipment, and nutrition services supplies, again utilizing the DGS' contract with Downtown Ford; and

**WHEREAS**, in November of 2022, Downtown Ford cancelled the District's vehicle purchase orders, citing various reasons that included oversale of production vehicles, labor shortages, and parts shortages; and

**WHEREAS**, following cancellation by Downtown Ford, the District contacted multiple dealers to inquire about the availability the vehicles for purchase, but was informed in each case that vehicles would not be available until the end of the year due to manufacturers switching model years; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to correspond with the timing for the 2024 production year vehicles becoming available in December of 2023, the District, in July of 2023, sought formal competitive bids for the needed vehicles (i.e., Bid No. 22-23-006); and

**WHEREAS**, despite extensive outreach by the District and interest from fifteen potential bidders, many of those dealers expressed an inability to submit bids with pricing guarantees due to the volatile vehicle market, uncertainty related to a recent United Auto Workers strike, and high demand for similar vehicles, all of which are sold on a first-come, first-serve basis with no inventory-holding options; and

**WHEREAS**, the District received only three responses to Bid No. 22-23-006: (i) Fairview Ford Sales, Inc Fleet and Truck Center ("Fairview Ford"); (ii) Los Angeles Truck Centers LLC dba Los Angeles Freightliner dba Velocity Truck Center ("LA Truck Center"); and (iii) Mountain View Chevrolet; and

WHEREAS, on October 26, 2023, subsequent to the District having awarded the contract for the needed vehicles to Fairview Ford and LA Truck Center informed the District that the manufacturer (i.e., Ford Motor Company) could not fulfill the entirety of the District's order, as the manufacturer had discontinued certain cargo vans that the District had ordered; and

WHEREAS, the trucks and vans in the District's vehicle fleet that have not been replaced are in extremely poor condition and at high risk of breakdown, jeopardizing the District's ability to maintain adequate operational services needed for the District to appropriately serve its students and staff, and resulting in an urgent need for the District to acquire replacement vehicles; and

WHEREAS, based on the current manufacturer delays and issues, and the availability of vehicles on a first-come, first-served basis as described by the many dealers, District staff believes that engaging in additional attempts to seek bids for the urgently-needed vehicles would be futile, would not result in any financial advantage for the District, and, from a practical perspective, would preclude the District from purchasing the vehicles; and

**WHEREAS**, the California Courts, in a line of cases that includes, among others, Los Angeles Dredging v. Long Beach (1930) 210 Cal. 348, Meakin v. Steveland (1977) 68 Cal.App.3d 490, and Graydon v. Pasadena Redevelopment Agency (1980) 104

Cal.App.3d 631, has determined that public bidding is not required if it would work an incongruity, would be unavailing as affecting the final result, would produce no financial advantage, and makes the procurement practically impossible; and

WHEREAS, District desires that the Board of Education authorize the District to issue Purchase Orders to dealers that, from time to time, have appropriate trucks and/or other cargo vehicles available for purchase, until such time as the existing aged and deteriorated vehicles have all been replaced, and subject to subsequent ratification of the purchase, in each case, by the Board of Education; and

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the Board of Education hereby resolves, determines and orders as follows:

- **Section 1.** The Board of Education hereby finds and determines that all of the foregoing recitals are true and correct, and hereby adopts such recitals as findings of the Board of Education.
- **Section 2.** The Board of Education hereby expressly finds that the District has an urgent need for the replacement vehicles described in this Resolution, as such vehicles are critical to adequate performance of the operational services required to appropriately serve the District's students and staff.
- **Section 3.** The Board of Education hereby expressly finds that additional attempts to competitively procure the urgently-needed vehicles would be futile, would not result in any financial advantage for the District, and would, from a practical perspective, prevent the District from purchasing the vehicles.
- **Section 4.** The Board of Education hereby authorizes and directs the District's Superintendent, its Lead Business Services Agent, it's Agent for Purchasing Services, and/or their respective designees, to issue purchase orders for the purchase of the urgently-needed vehicles, from time to time as necessary to replace the District's current aged and deteriorated fleet, and subject to such price and other terms as District staff determines are reasonable.
- **Section 5.** The Board of Education hereby directs District staff to present to the Board of Education for its ratification and approval, promptly following issuance, each of the purchase orders issued pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution.
- **Section 6.** The Board of Education hereby authorizes and directs the District's Superintendent, its Lead Business Services Agent, its Agent for Purchasing Services, and/or their respective designees, to take such other actions as reasonably necessary and/or convenient to accomplish the intent and purposes of this Resolution.
