1. <u>Public Comments from the Floor</u>: At this time, any person wishing to speak on any item <u>not on</u> the Agenda will be granted three minutes.

Keneisha Buffong, President of National Black Grads, spoke regarding the National Black Grads Ceremony held on Sunday, May 7, 2017, thanking everyone who attended, and also shared information regarding their resources and stated they want to continue working with the RUSD.

Tabresha Lawrence-McIntyre, Frisbie Middle School Math Coach, shared information regarding summer school opportunities at Frisbie Middle School. She thanked parents for attending a parent meeting regarding a change in the elective programs for ELA and mathematics. Lastly, she thanked PTO for their involvement and asked for continued support of PTO.

Sue Robertson, RUSD School Nurse, provided County contact information for a parent who reported problems in a County classroom. She spoke in support of the special education staff and the positive work they are doing, which she has witnessed every day in the classroom.

Lakiesa Low, parent, President of Werner Elementary School's APAC Committee, Parent Leader of COPE, and an active Disciple of the New Life Christian Church, expressed her concerns of what she stated "appears to be a push out" of African American administrators, employees, students, and high achieving students. She stated the coalition of concerned parents and community leaders request a meeting with Superintendent Avila to discuss these issues.

Pastor Samuel Casey, shared his concerns regarding what he states community and faith leaders within the community have coined "push out" of African American administrators and employees. He requested a meeting with Superintendent Avila to discuss these issues.

Laurette Allen, Frisbie Middle School teacher, spoke regarding a proposed policy Frisbie Middle School staff provided to Superintendent Avila with their solutions to issues with the current work order system. She asked that Derek Harris provide her a written response regarding the safety of her classroom, B9, and the procedures completed deeming the classroom safe. She also asked the Board to review the proposed policy and provide feedback.

Laura Goodloe, Frisbie Middle School teacher, thanked Clerk Montes and Member Ayala for speaking to staff and parents at Frisbie Middle School. She also expressed her gratitude to everyone who attended their tree planting ceremony, Maintenance for repairing the gas leaks, for the addition of two new security guards and a third security guard for next school year, and for outside counseling services for students. She shared some of the great programs at Frisbie Middle School: Classroom to Career program, the STEM Bowl, and the AVID program. Lastly, she invited the Board to their end of the year slide show on Monday at 9 o'clock, and she also thanked Inland Empire Children's Book Project for donating over 400 books to teachers for their students.

Leslie Theroith, RUSD School Nurse, spoke regarding African American students being below standards. She also expressed her concerns regarding a division in the community and asked for "equality for all stockholders such as students, community, and teachers."

Michelle Ramirez, Frisbie Middle School teacher, expressed her concerns regarding complaints and the way that parent complaints are handled. She asked for changes in the parent complaint form to be made into three distinct levels of protocol and streamlined for easier understanding, that Board policy be implemented that makes the Board and Superintendent the last line of defense, not the first, and that a public relations agent position be implemented to handle all complaints.

Tina Sanchez, School Secretary, Frisbie Middle School, questioned the discipline procedures regarding administrators, and spoke regarding the "unjustified termination" of Principal Osonduagwuike. She asked that a policy be put in place to keep the Board informed so that they can make informed decisions.

Jennifer Truett, RUSD Speech Language Pathologist, spoke, with the Speech Department by her side, expressing her concerns that the majority of the Speech Language Pathologists have been over caseload for the entire 2016-2017 school year, and they do not have a caseload max. She asked that the District post open positions and recruit in a timely manner.

Raquel Castro, RUSD Speech Language Pathologist, expressed her concerns regarding the shortage of speech language pathologists to cover services for all of our students, the importance of a competitive salary schedule, and speech language pathologists leaving for a more competitive salary and manageable caseloads.

Fronie Medina, RUSD Part-Time Speech Language Pathologist, spoke regarding part time pathologists not being compensated by not moving up on the salary schedule every two years as neighboring districts.

Jenna Crossley, RUSD First Year Speech Language Pathologist, shared that she is a 3rd generation RUSD employee and was happy to complete her clinical fellowship here, however, she will be leaving RUSD at the end of the school year as she accepted a position in a neighboring district that offers a more competitive salary schedule and offers better caseload support.

Michael Calof, Attorney representing Genevieve Nevarez, requested the Board take action to grant Mrs. Nevarez the requested six month extended period of time to receive medical and employee benefits.

Nora Mendoza, parent, stated she is sad to see that we're speaking about "colors" instead of the education of our children. She stated that if the Principal's of Frisbie and Bemis were doing a great job, parents would not be looking at other schools and other options. She is pleased with the changes that are coming to the District, focusing on the education of all our children.

Lanae Norwood, representing United Nations of Consciousness, advocates for the African American communities, spoke regarding what she felt was the inequity of African American personnel and children in the district. She asked that the district conduct a thorough analysis of recent "push out" of African American personnel, develop a comprehensive leadership development plan that ensures the recruitment and retention of African American personnel, and a comprehensive plan that closes the achievement gap for African American students. Lastly, she requested implementation of comprehensive and culturally responsive restorative justice practices that all students benefit from.

Enaz Wanzer, parent, provided the Board with a Uniform Complaint form in reference to her IEP meeting held today. She also spoke regarding issues she is having with the special education program and recording parent conference meetings.

Christina O'Handley, parent, congratulated the scholarship recipients. She thanked Mohammad Islam for checking on the problem in the classroom at Frisbie Middle School, and Clerk Montes and Member Ayala for meeting with the parents of Frisbie Middle School. She also expressed her appreciation to Clerk Montes for staying to witness the problems at Frisbie Middle School that every school has in regards to students not being picked up after school. She thanked Dr. Madrid, Ms. Valenzuela

and Ms. Miner for the parent programs, and she would like to see more programs for ADHD. She shared that she attended a CABE meeting and learned through Proposition 58 that there is \$8.5 billion available; however, it is up to the schools to apply for the money and it may be used for ADHD staff training.

Emilia Carrero, parent, she shared the benefits of having more bilingual staff at the district and school sites to help with the parents who do not speak or understand English.

Candelaria Oceguera, was called to the podium. She allowed Magdelena Benitez, parent, to speak in her stead. She shared that she is pleased having Dr. Avila as our Superintendent, and she thanked him for sending Mrs. Hernandez to Hughbanks Elementary School. She shared that she feels changes are good, and we should be united by education, by thinking of our children and not by thinking of the changes as racial problems.

Celia Zelya, representing Amigos Unidos, a support group for parents of children with special needs, wanted to remind the Board of the invitation to a celebration of the sacraments of special needs children on Sunday, May 21, 2017, at 3:00 p.m., in the Cathedral in San Bernardino. She congratulated all graduates and wished them continued success. She expressed how proud she is of the teachers, the Superintendent, and the Board for the work they are doing, and she hopes that they continue to work united for our students. She stated that due to the shortage of Speech Language Pathologists, she asked that more positions be opened. She shared that she feels everyone should stay united not fight regarding colors.

Mirna Ruiz, parent and PTA Vice President, thanked everyone who was present at their PTA dinner. She shared how upset she is regarding a speaker who spoke regarding a County special education student, and how this student lives in Rialto and deserves every service available from the RUSD. She spoke regarding her experiences with special education concerns and what parents have to fight for to get the services their students deserve.

A group of four Morris Elementary School parents thanked Superintendent Avila for the remodeling at their school in terms of safety. They also wanted everyone to know that change is good and that they are very pleased with Dr. Avila as the Superintendent and also the Board.

Notwithstanding the process described above, any portion of a comprehensive safety plan that includes tactical responses to criminal incidents that may result in death or serious bodily injury at the school site, including steps to be taken to safeguard students and staff, secure the affected school premises, and apprehend the criminal perpetrator(s), shall be developed by District administrators in accordance with Education Code 32281. In developing such strategies, District administrators shall consult with law enforcement officials and with a representative of an employee bargaining unit, if he/she chooses to participate.

When reviewing the tactical response plan, the Board may meet in closed session to confer with law enforcement officials, provided that any vote to approve the tactical response plan is announced in open session following the closed session. (Education Code 32281)

TOBACCO-FREE SCHOOLS

The Board of Education recognizes that smoking and other uses of tobacco and nicotine products constitute a serious public health hazard and are inconsistent with District goals to provide a healthy environment for students and staff.

Thisese prohibitions applyies to all employees, students and visitors at any school-sponsored instructional program, activity, or athletic event held on or off District property. Any written joint use agreement governing community use of District facilities or grounds shall include notice of the District's tobacco-free schools policy and consequences for violations of the policy.

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The products prohibited include any product containing tobacco or nicetine, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, miniature cigars, smokeless tobacco, snuff, chew, clove cigarettes, betel, electronic cigarettes, electronic hookahs, and other vapor emitting devices, with or without nicetine content, that mimic the use of tobacco products.

TOBACCO-FREE SCHOOLS (continued)

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying of any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, tobacco, or plant product intended for inhalation, whether natural or synthetic, in any manner or form, and includes the use of an electronic smoking device that creates aerosol or vapor or of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking. (Business and Professions Code 22950.5; Education Code 48901)

Tobacco products include: (Business and Professions Code 22950.5; Education Code 48901)

- 1. Any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, little cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, or snuff
- 2. An electronic device that delivers nicotine or other vaporized liquids to the person inhaling from the device, including, but not limited to, an electronic cigarette, cigar, pipe, or hookah
- 3. Any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product, whether or not sold separately

This policy does not prohibit the use or possession of prescription products and other cessation aids that have been approved by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Food and Drug Administration, such as nicotine patch or gum.

Smoking or use of any tobacco-related product and disposal of any tobacco-related waste is prohibited within 25 feet of any playground, except on a public sidewalk located within 25 feet of the playground. In addition, any form of intimidation, threat, retaliation against a person for attempting to enforce this policy is prohibited. (Health and Safety Code 104495)

The 2015-2016 Consolidated Application for Funding Categorical Aid Programs, Part I, is used by the California Department of Education (CDE) to distribute categorical funds from State and Federal programs to California's Local Educational Agencies (LEA's). Title I School-wide programs permit the use of Title I funds to raise academic achievement for all students and improve the entire educational program of the school.

AMENDMENT NO.1 TO AGREEMENT WITH DUKE CULTURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT, LLC

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Final Initial Study-Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS-MND) document, prepared by VCS Environmental for the Rialto Unified School District Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Fueling Station and Transportation Yard project was accepted by the City of Rialto and filed with California Department of Fish and Wildlife in February, 2015. Pursuant to the Mitigation and Monitoring Program in the IS-MND, in January, 2016 the District hired Duke Cultural Resources Management, LLC, a qualified archaeologist and paleontologist, to monitor during grading/trenching operations to determine if the sediments are likely to produce historical archaeological and/or paleontological resources.

The project is approaching completion by July. Due to excessive rain from December to March, and the extra time taken by Southern California Edison in its engineering review of the project, CNG construction timetable has been extended six (6) months. Additional monitoring during grading/trenching for installation of conduits from CNG station to the District warehouse is required to complete the services. Duke Cultural Resources Management, LLC, proposes \$1,425.00 for additional monitoring services to the original services agreement of \$7,200.00, and an extension of twelve (12) months to the original agreement which expired on December 30, 2016.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve Amendment No. 1 with Duke Cultural Resources Management, LLC, to continue required monitoring services for an extension of twelve (12) months from December 30, 2016 to December 30, 2017, and an additional cost not-to-exceed \$1,425.00 to the original agreement of \$7,200.00 for a total cost not-to-exceed \$8,625.00, to be paid from Fund 40, Special Reserve Fund.

COURSES FOR APPROVAL

June 7, 2017

Education Services requests the Board of Education approve the middle and high school courses listed below to be offered at our secondary schools during the 2017-2018 school year. These include courses in the areas of Career Technical Education, English Language Arts, English Language Development, Electives, Foreign Language, and Social Studies. These courses were approved in their curriculum committees and were approved at the May 15, 2017 Curriculum Council meeting.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS/ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

English Language Development I (ELD 1)

(5 credits each semester)

Grades 6-8

English Language Development (ELD) 1 is designed for newcomer (fewer than 3 years in U.S. schools) English Learner students identified as having **Beginning/Limited Functional** proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing English (California English Language Development Test/English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (CELDT/ELPAC overall level1), per the CELDT/ELPAC test and other diagnostic/placement tools. ELD 1 I to be taken once for a maximum of 10 English credits.

English Language Development (ELD II)

(5 credits each semester)

Grades 6-8

English Language Development II (ELDII) is an English Language Arts course that must be taken concurrently with the ELD II Support course. Students who have been in the United States for fewer than 3 years and have scored an Early Intermediate (2) CELDT / a somewhat functional (2) ELPAC proficiency level are to be placed in this course. This is an intensive course to accelerate student's literacy. Continued knowledge and usage of spoken and written grammatical forms in a sequential progression are taught. Literacy skills in English will be further developed.

ELECTIVE

College and Career Prep (Middle School) (5 credits each semester)

Grades 6-8

This is an intensive course to accelerate academic language acquisition in all content areas. Students will focus on using complex, abstract and academic-related forms of English to be successful in their academic program. This course will place a tremendous emphasis on students' receptive and expressive skills to ensure that they obtain academic oral skills that will transfer to writing. Students will have ample opportunities to collaborate with one another and internalize new language structures acquired.

English Language Development1 Support (ELD1 Support) (5 credits each semester) Grades 6-8

English Language Development (ELD) 1 Support is an <u>elective</u> course that must be taken concurrently with the ELD 1 course. This course provides additional time to accelerate student's literacy skills to English. Knowledge and the usage of spoken and written grammatical forms are taught in a sequential progression. Phonemic awareness and phonics of English are emphasized to teach reading. Students will begin using simple forms and gradually move to more complex, abstract and academic-related forms of English. The students will have ample opportunities to practice, repeat and internalize the new language structures acquired.

English Language Development (ELD II) is a English Language Arts course that must be taken concurrently with the ELD II course. Students who have been in the United States for fewer than 3 years and have scored an Early Intermediate (2) CELDT / a somewhat functional (2) ELPAC proficiency level are to be placed in this course. Instruction is devoted to the acquisition of receptive and expressive English language skills in an accelerated setting. ELD II students will earn students English credits.

HIGH SCHOOL

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Advanced Law Enforcement P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grade 11-12

This is the Law Enforcement capstone course. This course examines and applies methods of transferring perspectives, knowledge and skills from the classroom to a career in the law enforcement industry. An overview of career opportunities, resume preparation, and job interviewing skills is conducted.

Careers with Children P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grade 10-12

This is a revised capstone course prepares students for employment in the care and guidance of young children under the supervision of child development professionals. This course combines classroom instruction with work-based training in child development settings (preschool classrooms, secondary special education classrooms, and/or various child care centers). The course will focus on curriculum development, safety concerns, discipline techniques, growth and development of infant, toddler, preschool and school-age children.

International Cuisine and Catering P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grades 11-12

This year long course is designed to provide students with a comprehensive study and experiential learning of the world's major cuisines. Various regions of the world will be covered including North America, Latin America, Europe, the Mediterranean, Asia, Africa and the Middle East. Students will examine the influence of geography and climate upon the production of agriculture and available natural food sources.

Language of Medicine P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grades 10

This competency-based course is designed for all students seeking a career in the health care field. The course will focus on the concepts and principles of the structure function and systems of the human body in relation to human growth and development. Students will learn skills necessary for their health care career pathway including: legal and ethical responsibilities, cultural considerations in the health care industry, decision making, accepting personal responsibility and self-management. Integrated throughout the course are career preparation standards, which include basic academic skills, communication skills, interpersonal skills, problem solving, workplace safety, technology and employment literacy.

Law Enforcement I P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grade 10

This is an introductory course that emphasizes the importance of ethical standards and moral decision-making in today's law enforcement. There is a descriptive overview of the court system, aspects of modern day policing in America, police trends and criminal law.

This is an intermediate course that builds upon the foundation of Law Enforcement 1. This course examines criminal justice procedures, corrections, and analyzes law enforcement. Police systems and culture, and the role of the police limitations imposed on law enforcement in a democratic society in accordance with the U.S. Constitution.

Video Production P (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

This course covers the history and development of the cinema, documentaries, and other new media and film technologies. Students learn skills and practices in various aspects of cinema and video production by applying the elements of art, principles of design, integration of technology for the effective visual communication of their ideas, feeling, and values. Students develop skills, including camera/recording operation, framing and composition, manipulations of space and time, idea development and communication, the mechanics and psychology of editing, script writing or text creation, light and sound and impact.

Welding Technologies P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grade 11-12

This course provides students with an understanding of manufacturing processes common to careers in welding and related industries.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS/ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

Edge English B P (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grade 9

Edge English B is a yearlong English course that utilizes the Hampton-Brown Edge Program for mastery in reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Edge B is organized thematically around a group of ideas or issues, using a variety of works and examining rhetorical strategies and stylist choices. Edge English B introduces students to critical thinking and the fundamental academic writing. Through the writing process, students refine topics, develop and support ideas, investigate, evaluate, and incorporate appropriate resource. Students will also edit for effective style and usage and determine appropriate approaches for a variety of contexts, audiences, and purpose. Writing activities include expository and argumentative.

Edge English C P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Edge C is a yearlong English course. The purpose of Edge English C is to improve student reading fundamentals, comprehension and critical thinking skills, teach specified reading behaviors, expand academic concepts and vocabulary (including world learning strategies), develop a stronger word consciousness, strengthen literary analysis (including recognizing genres and literary devices/elements), compare, evaluate, criticize literature. Furthermore, students in Edge English C will expand on different modes of writing: learn the writing process, and the traits of good writing. Edge English C also provides an intense study of grammar, usage, mechanics, and spelling that are interwoven throughout the program.

English Language Development I (ELD 1)

(5 credits each semester)

Grades 9-12

English Language Development (ELD) 1 is designed for newcomer (fewer than 3 years in U.S. schools) English Learner students identified as having Beginning/Limited Functional proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing English (California English Language Development Test/English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (CELDT/ELPAC overall level1), per the CELDT/ELPAC test and other diagnostic/placement tools. ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS/ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT ELECTIVE COURSES

College and Career Prep (High School) (5 credits each semester)

Grades 9-12

This is an intensive <u>elective</u> course to accelerate academic language acquisition in all content areas. Students will focus on using complex, abstract and academic-related forms of English to be successful in their academic program. This course will place a tremendous emphasis on students' receptive and expressive skills to ensure that they obtain academic oral skills that will transfer to writing. Students will have ample

English Language Development I Support (ELD | Support) (5 credits each semester) Grades 9-12

English Language Development (ELD) 1 Support is an <u>elective</u> course that must be taken concurrently with the ELD 1 course. This course provides additional time to accelerate student's literacy skills to English. Knowledge and the usage of spoken and written grammatical forms are taught in a sequential progression. Phonemic awareness and phonics of English are emphasized to teach reading. Students will begin using simple forms and gradually move to more complex, abstract and academic-related forms of English. The students will have ample opportunities to practice, repeat and internalize the new language structures acquired.

English Language Development II Support (ELD II Support) (5 credits each semester) Grades 9-12

English Language Development (ELD) II is a English Language Arts <u>elective</u> course that must be taken concurrently with the ELD II course. Students who have been in the United States for fewer than 3 years and have scored an Early Intermediate (2) CELDT / a somewhat functional (2) ELPAC proficiency level are to be placed in this course. Instruction is devoted to the acquisition of receptive and expressive English language skills in an accelerated setting. ELD II students will earn students English credits.

Speech & Debate P (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

Speech and Debate is a survey course for students 9th grade and above and is designed to give a broad overview of the various events in the competitive speech and debate. The first half of the class is focused on speech during which students write, prepare and present at least four different types of speeches. The second half of the class deals with debate and students learn, prepare and practice Public Forum and Student Congress debates. The extensive research and practice required to learn each of these speech and debate forms results in a rigorous work load that is equivalent to an 11th of 12th grade course.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

Spanish 4 For Patient Care P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 10-12

Spanish 4 for Patient Care is a level four LOTE ("e") course developed using the new CTE content standards and aligns with the Patient Care pathway standards within the Health, Science, Medical Technology CTE sector. Medical caregivers must be able to communicate with the Spanish speaking patient on a medically and linguistically appropriate level. Students will build a framework of vocabulary and language for practice with management of health-related situations such as an infectious disease

outbreak, treatment of injuries, cardiopulmonary complications, and diabetes. From this established foundation of common scenarios encountered in medical settings, students will incorporate standard medical terminology, knowledge of anatomy and physiology, and patient assessment with clear, accurate Spanish communication in an effort to fuse the medical responder with the medical communicator. This hybrid Spanish-Healthcare provider responder represents the future of accurate, responsible healthcare, paving a road to uncompromised medical services for the Spanish-speaking patient.

MATHEMATICS

Mathematical Reasoning with Connections P (5 credits each semester)UC 'A-G' Pending Grade12

The MRWC is designed as a 4th year mathematics course following Math I-III (or Algebra 1, 2, or Geometry) that will provide a bridge into multiple college and career options, including STEAM, CTE, and non-technical pathways. Students successfully completing MRWC will have acquired content skills and attitudes towards learning that will be expected in entry-level college mathematics. This course was designed by the California State University System for high school students who scored Conditionally Ready on the Early Assessment Program (EAP) to fulfill the college readiness status.

Sports Statistics P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grade 11*-12 (*For grade 11: only students who have completed successfully their Math 3 course sequence)

This course teaches students how to use the four-steps of the statistical process in the context of sports: ask questions, collect data, analyze data, and draw conclusions. Each chapter will begin with a sports related statistical question (e.g., Is there a home field advantage in the NFL?) and then students will learn how to collect appropriate data, how to analyze the data, and how to make appropriate conclusions. Although the context of the examples and exercises will be sports related, the primary focus of the class will be to teach the students the basic principles of statistical reasoning. Use of technology, including statistical software, online applets, and the graphing calculator will be prominent in the course. Students will also have to complete investigations which require all four steps of the statistical process to be completed using data collected online or by the students themselves.

SCIENCE

Environmental Science P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

The Environmental Science college prep course is an interdisciplinary curriculum, combining both ideas and practices from the fields of ecology, chemistry, physics, geology, climatology, economics, politics, and ethics. The course curriculum is guided by NGSS and by the California Environmental Principle and Concepts.

Environmental Science HP (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

The Environmental Science college prep course is an interdisciplinary curriculum, combining both ideas and practices from the fields of ecology, chemistry, physics, geology, climatology, economics, politics, and ethics. The course curriculum is guided by NGSS and by the California Environmental Principle and Concepts. This course contains additional labs, projects, etc. for students to get honors credit.

Exploring Marine Environments P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending Grades 10-12

The Environmental Science college prep course is an interdisciplinary curriculum, combining both ideas and practices from the fields of ecology, chemistry, physics, geology, climatology, economics, politics, and ethics. The course curriculum is guided by NGSS and by the California Environmental Principle and Concepts.

Exploring Marine Environments HP (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 10-12

The Environmental Science honors course is an interdisciplinary curriculum, combining both ideas and practices from the fields of ecology, chemistry, physics, geology, climatology, economics, politics, and ethics. The course curriculum is guided by NGSS and by the California Environmental Principle and Concepts. This course contains additional labs, projects, etc. for students to get honors credit.

Global Health P (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

Global Health is a college preparatory, laboratory science designed to provide students with the factual knowledge, and analytical skills necessary to explore phenomena related to global health issues. Utilizing integrated Next Generation Science Standards students will investigate physical, earth and space, life science and engineering concepts in conjunction with health related phenomena.

The Living Earth P (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

This is an embedded college preparatory science course with Biology and Earth Science. Students will examine the biological topics: ecology, evolution, genetics, and cells to organisms along with the Earth science evidence that supports these topics. This is an embedded science course with Biology and related Earth Standards. It will allow students to demonstrate mastery of the Next Generation Science Standards.

The Living Earth HP (5 credits each semester)

UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 10-12

This is an honors embedded honors college- preparatory science course with Biology and Earth Science. Students will have to submit a Science Fair Project and do research reports on advanced topics Students will examine the biological topics: ecology, evolution, genetics, and cells to organisms along with the Earth science evidence that supports these topics. This course will allow students to demonstrate mastery of the Next Generation Science Standards. As this is an honors course, students will have to submit a Science Fair Project and do research reports on advanced topics.

SOCIAL STUDIES ELECTIVE

American Justice System P (5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 10-12

This is a Social Studies elective course. It is meant to be a continuation of the course of study for students enrolled in law related education courses, specifically for students interested in pursuing a career in the legal field. In this course students should gain a practical understanding of the law and the legal system that have been developed under the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights. They should become aware of current issues and controversies relating to law and the legal system and be encouraged to participate as citizens in the legal process. The course includes a study of concepts underlying the law as well as an introduction to the origin and development of our legal system, including civil and criminal law. Students should learn about the rights guaranteed by the first, fourth, fifth, sixth, eighth and fourteenth amendments and the important court cases that shaped their legal interpretation.

VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS

Animation I College P (5credits each semester)UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 10-12

Animation I is a revised course that exposes students to the skills concepts and theories in animation in an artist-scholar mindset that includes the integration of technical abilities, reading, writing and reflection with the incorporation of computer technology.

Grades 11-12

This course further develops the skills, techniques, and aesthetic sensibilities of students, including fundamental concepts, historical and contemporary references, art criticism, and creative expression. Through the artistic process, students will develop their voice while exploring concepts and ideas important to them.

Digital Photography P(5 credits each semester) UC 'A-G' Pending

Grades 9-12

Digital Photography helps to develop competency in the digital darkroom through lessons and projects that teach photographic concepts, composition, and principles of 2-dimensional design. These skills will be applied to developing an expressive visual language using digital imaging and editing through Photoshop. Each student will be encouraged to develop a personal vision evidenced by a portfolio through a process that includes research, practice and reflection. Prerequisite recommended: Art 1

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve these new courses that will be utilized by all secondary schools in the district beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

AGREEMENT WITH SAN BERNARDINO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AB104 ADULT EDUCATION BLOCK GRANT (AEBG)

ILLUMINATE EDUCATION, INC DATA AND ASSESSMENT SYSTEM

June 7, 2017

Education Services requests the Board of Education to renew the agreement with Illuminate Education, Inc., commonly known as Illuminate, for the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Illuminate Data and Assessment System is a web based longitudinal system designed to meet the data and assessment needs of all Rialto Unified School District staff including District level administrators that need to analyze trends, instructional leaders that require fast and flexible reports to shape curriculum and instruction, and teachers that need to create assessments with ease and obtain instant feedback for formative use in the classroom. The ability to view and analyze the District's data is also a requirement of the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and the Local Education Agency (LEA) Plan. Illuminate Data and Assessment System include innovative custom reporting tools, built-in analysis support, and a groundbreaking approach to assessment. The agreement also includes data import support, student demographic management, software license, data security, system maintenance, system support, user support for the length of the contract, grade cam, and ongoing system upgrades at no additional cost for RUSD.

The Illuminate agreement also includes the Inspect Item Bank provided by Key Data Systems, which is Common Core State Standards (CCSS) aligned and will support creating teacher and District level assessments in English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and History Social Science for students in grades 2 through 12. RUSD staff can also create and publish any number of assessments using the online system. Each assessment includes rationales, and may be comprised of various question formats which may include constructed response, selected response, technology enhanced, and/or performance tasks. Assessment questions are written to the rigor and style of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the Illuminate Data and Assessment System agreement with Illuminate Education, Inc. that includes the Inspect Item Bank from July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018, at \$4.50 per student for Illuminate Services software and grade cam (\$115,578.00) and \$1.50 per student for Inspect Item Bank (\$38,526.00) at a cost not-to-exceed \$154,104.00, to be paid from Title I, Part A.

SECONDARY ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT FOR NEWCOMER ENGLISH LEARNERS TEXTBOOK ADOPTION

June 7, 2017

Education Services requests the Board of Education approve the adoption of the iLit ELL English Language Arts/English Language Development program for grades 6-12 Core materials.

The California State Board of Education released the new Common Core Standards aligned English Language Arts/English Language Development (ELA/ELD) programs in November 2015 for grades 6-8. The District has local control to choose the materials for secondary schools as long as there is a committee that includes teachers who are involved in the process.

Beginning in November 2015, English Learner Programs started the textbook adoption process for secondary Newcomer English Learners (ELs). The secondary Newcomer EL textbook adoption committee was formed with all secondary Newcomer EL teachers, ELA/ELD coaches from the middle school and Language Development coaches from the high school. Eight (8) teachers from various grade levels, eight (8) site coaches, the lead secondary ELA/ELD strategist and the director and coordinator of EL Programs participated on the committee. Approximately nineteen (19) people participated in the secondary Newcomer EL textbook committee adoption process.

All who participated attended a calibration meeting where components of an ideal ELD program for Newcomers was discussed. Two publishers on the state adoption list were invited to present their programs to the committee. Several study sessions were held after the presentations to go through each of the programs and consider the pros and cons. Teachers received sample materials and were asked to carefully review the programs presented. On December 9, 2016, a meeting was called for the committee to discuss the strengths and weaknesses of each program.

A school vote was taken at the meeting based on the committee's sharing of information on the strengths and weaknesses of each program. The vote was unanimous; the eight (8) secondary schools with ELD programs for Newcomers chose iLit ELL by Pearson.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the adoption of the iLit English Language Arts/English Language Development series for grades 6-12 Core materials for Newcomer English Learners. The series will serve as our base program in English Language Arts and English Language Development (ELD) for secondary Newcomers for the next eight (8) years and will include both print and online resources. The cost of the new adoption is approximately \$96,545.00 to cover a total of eight (8) years of ELD courses grades 6-12 and will be paid from the District General Fund.

ELEMENTARY MATH FOR DUAL LANGUAGE IMMERSION TEXTBOOK ADOPTION BOYD, GARCIA, KELLEY AND MORRIS ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

June 7, 2017

Education Services requests the Board of Education approve the adoption of Matemáticas Diarias (Everyday Mathematics) as the core mathematics program in first grade for the Dual Language Immersion (DLI) program.

The California State Board of Education released the new Common Core Standards aligned math programs in January 2014. The fourth edition of Matemáticas Diarias was published in 2015 and is aligned to the mathematics Common Core standards. The District has local control to choose instructional materials as long as there is "substantial teacher involvement and promotion of the involvement of parents and other community members"; conditions which have been met.

Beginning in November 2016, English Learner Programs started the textbook adoption process for mathematics for the DLI Program. The DLI Elementary Math textbook adoption committee was formed with eleven (11) teachers, four (4) site strategists, two (2) district lead strategists, one (1) district elementary math lead strategist, seven (7) site administrators and the director and coordinator of English Learner Programs.

All who participated, attended a calibration meeting in November where components of an ideal mathematics program for the DLI program were discussed and an evaluation tool was developed. The committee also established the process for reviewing materials and how the final vote would be taken. Four publishers were invited to present their programs to the committee. Several study sessions were held after the presentations to consider the pros and cons of each program. Teachers received sample materials and logins to access digital content and were asked to carefully review the programs presented. A committee meeting was held on May 3, 2017, to discuss the strengths and weaknesses of each program. Prior to the vote, the committee decided that the adoption would only be done for the first grade. Each DLI school received one vote to cast for their chosen program. The vote was unanimous; all four DLI schools chose Matemáticas Diarias as the first grade math program for DLI. Materials were placed on display in each Kindergarten classroom at the four (4) DLI schools for parent preview and comments.

The Dual Language Immersion Committee chose to view and adopt Everyday Math because it is based on research conducted at the University of Chicago, School of Mathematics and because of the emphasis that the program places on helping elementary students acquire a deeper understanding of conceptual mathematics.

A presentation of the Matemáticas Diarias program and vote to approve were made to the Elementary Math Curriculum Committee on May 11, 2017. Notice was given that the program was on display in Kindergarten DLI classrooms at Boyd, Garcia, Kelley and Morris Elementary Schools.

At their May 15, 2017 meeting, the Rialto Unified School District Curriculum Council approved the adoption of Matemáticas Diarias as the core mathematics program for first grade DLI classes.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the adoption of Matemáticas Diarias as the core mathematics program for the first grade Dual Language Immersion (DLI) Program. The program will include both print and online resources. The cost of the DLI first grade mathematics adoption is approximately \$11,300.00 for one year and will be paid from the District General Fund.

RENEW AGREEMENT WITH PRACTI-CAL OPTION YEAR 2 MEDI-CAL LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY (LEA) BILLING OPTION SERVICES

June 7, 2017

On October 21, 2015, the Board of Education approved to ratify an agreement with Practi-Cal for Medi-Cal Local Education Agency (LEA) Billing Option Services with the option to renew for two (2) subsequent years. At this time, the Student Services Department requests the Board of Education approve to renew Option Year 2 effective July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018.

The Medi-Cal Billing Option Program provides federal financial participation (FFP) reimbursement to school districts for health-related services provided by qualified medical practitioner such as Speech Therapists, School Psychologists and School Nurses to students receiving special education services and who are on Medi-Cal. School Districts can claim reimbursement for services that include assessments and treatments as per the Individualized Education Plan (IEP).

To best maximize billing reimbursement, most districts enter into a contract with providers such as Practi-Cal. Providers, like Practi-Cal, offer the most comprehensive LEA Billing Option Program services available to California School Districts and County Offices of Education. Practi-Cal offers a full spectrum of LEA Billing Option Program support such as data collection, transmission, eligibility verification and claims reconciliation. Consultants work with the District by providing staff training, support and help to create the necessary billing forms that can be accessed from their online module that is compliant with submitting billing to the California Department of Health Care Services. The Medi-Cal Billing Option Program allows districts to be reimbursed a portion of the cost of providing some services to eligible Special Education students.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve an agreement of Option Year 2 with Practi-Cal for Medi-Cal Local Education Agency (LEA) Billing Option Services, effective July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018. The District shall pay Practi-Cal 8.5%, or not-to-exceed \$80,000 per year, of the current federal match rate of claims submitted to the Department of Health Care Services. If the annual fees exceed 10%, the difference will be rebated back to the District. All costs to be paid from the LEA funds.

ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 16-17-35 EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT

June 7, 2017

The voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012. Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution. The provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state general fund an Education Protection Account (EPA) to receive and disburse revenue derived from the increase in tax rates that will be made available for transfer into the EPA this fiscal year. The school district shall have sole authority to determine how the monies received from the EPA are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction. The monies received from the EPA shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost.

The expenditure plan for FY 2017-18 is being presented to the Board of Education so that the expenditures can be appropriately applied to the EPA on the financial system before the end of the year. Due to the annual requirement for Board action, and the fact that EPA apportionments will not be certified until late in the 2017-18 fiscal year, this is only an estimate of the EPA revenue.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 16-17-35 which approves the plan to spend the monies received from the Education Protection Account (EPA) on Instruction.

RESOLUTION NO. 16-17-35 EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT

June 07, 2017

WHEREAS, California voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f);

WHEREAS, before June 30th of each year, the Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates made pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during FY 2017-18;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

- 1. The monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board of Rialto;
- 2. In compliance with Article XIII, Section 36(e), with the California Constitution, the governing board of the Rialto Unified School District has determined to spend the monies received from the Education Protection Act as attached.

Each quarter the district shall provide an updated list containing each substitute teacher, his/her current address, telephone number, and email address. The Union will be provided within ten (10) work days the name of the substitute removed from site/classroom due to disciplinary reasons. Each June a list of negative evaluations received during the school year, categorized by type and site (no names), will be given to CWA. The District shall provide a list of substitute teachers to the Union by October 15th of each year.
