Future Homemaker Picked at EHS

On December 1, 1959, nearly 380,000 senior girls in high schools across the nation took an examination—a test of "Homemaking Knowledge and Attitudes."

The test was part of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. This program, sponsored by General Mills, is designed to further the dignity and prestige of the American Home and to stimulate interest in the art of homemaking. It also helps emphasize the outstanding contributions to the American home being made by high school teachers throughout the United States.

The examination was given in about 12,600 high schools—in 50 states and the District of Columbia. After the test, every girl received a personal copy of "Betty Crocker's Homemaker Profiler and Guide to Homemaking." Then the tests were graded by Science Research Associates—an educational testing organization. From test results, a Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for each school

Creating special effects with color can be fun! But first learn what . . . and what not . . . to

Who's the girl with beautiful red glints in her hair? It could, by tommorrow, be you! With the wonderful "water colors" available now, you can make up your hair for a party just as you make up your eyes-and return, if you wish, to your natural tresses in the morning. Be sure it is a water-color before you start experimenting. Read the label carefully: if it doesn't say-clearlythat you can wash it out, put it back on the shelf. Permanent tints, dyes and bleaches are for older hair that has lost its luster. They take years of practice to be successfully applied. And this includes the hair lighteners too. Usually these permanent products lift colors from your hair. Temporary coloring works much like your lipstick: it "paints" the hair, it doesn't change the color underneath. Naturally then, if you're a brunette, you won't become a blonde by using a blonde color rinse or shampoo. You may get some highlighting effects, course, since lighter hairs and you have up to twenty-six shades of hair on your head) will pick up the color. Generally, however,

The original examination of each school Homemaker of Tomorrow is now being compared with the examination papers of all the other school winners in her state—and a State Homemaker of Tomorrow will soon be announced. This representative girl will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship and an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and the nation's capital. Her school will receive a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

In each state there will also be a \$500 scholarship awarded to the school Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow who is the second highest rating girl in her state.

Finally, on April 28, 1960, all of the State Homemakers will be guests of Betty Crocker at a dinner in Washington, D.C. Here the Search program will reach its climax—for on this night the name of the All-American Homemaker in the states and the District of Columbia—and she will represent most fully those qualities that make our nation's homes the heart of our society and the source of our freedom and our material and spiritual progress. To the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will go a \$5,000 college scholarship. The second, third, and fourth ranking State Homemaker of Tomorrow in the nation will be awarded \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively. By their achievements they will reflect honor to all homemakers of America.

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
