Seniors Visit Courthouse

For the past two Mondays, Seniors have been going to the County Courthouse. The program began with a talk given by Commissioner of Jurors, Mr. Short. He explained the Judicial system and told them in which courts cases were being held. A typical agenda was: Dept. 1 (court), an injunction; Dept. 2, an eminent domain case; Dept. 3, jury selection; Dept. 4, Juvenile Court; Dept. 5, personal in-

jury (auto); Dept. 6, forgery; Dept. 7, bad checks. After watching two sessions they were dismissed to lunch. While the Seniors were in the Juvenile Dept., Mr. Lusk, the head of the department, gave them a short lecture on the Juvenile crime problem as it consists in San Bernardino County today. Juvenile Court handles cases up to 18 years of age, and can accept up to 21 if they feel it can help. However, the judge has the right to refuse.

Some of the Seniors were able to talk to judges themselves. One group, which was visiting Dept. 5, talked to the Honorable Jesse W. Curtis Jr., in his elaborate chambers. He seemed to possess a totally different character when off the bench. He had a great sense of humor, and was very willing to answer their questions.

Immediately following, students were taken to the county jail to observe the practices employed there. Many admitted it was one of the most heartbreaking sights they'll ever see. Sergeant Balinger, our guide, seemed to possess a coldness that was necessary for his job. He said that the jail was "merely for detainment not for rehabilitation."

The crime lab was next on the program, where the latest criminalistics were shown by Anthony Longetti.

Last was the inspection of the Search and Rescue equipment which consisted of Com-

I would like to take this opportunity right now to thank each and every student who participated in this activity. If you could have only seen the expressions on these people's faces when they came into the social hall at Patton and saw the table full of gifts. The gifts were not elaborate or expensive . . . no . . . all they were, were little handkerchiefs and neckties. But to these people who have nothing, it was like handing them a million dollars.

All of the students who went on this field trip to Patton were very frightful at the thought of going to a mental hospital and especially to an epilepsy ward. It was even more terrifying when while we were singing Christmas carols a patient suffered a petit mal seizure. Three hours later when we left the hospital we had an entirely different attitude on mental illness than we did when we entered.

I had such a wonderful feeling inside of me for my school, EHS, for giving these people something to be happy about. I only wish that each and every one of you could have experienced this great Christmas joy.

Letter From The Principal

December 13, 1960 Dear Students:

I have been asked this week to make some comments about current status of the the American Field Service program for the 1961-62 school year. As you will remember, this is the program whereby one or two foreign students will be enrolled at Eisenhower High School for the next school year. It looks like our dreams are going to be realized, what with the success that we had at the Goddard program in raising close to \$300.00, and also in the support that we are receiving from the community. As you know, we need to raise \$650.00 to bring each student to Eisenhower High School. It appears now that the program is assured, and we will submit our application for a student to-American Field Service by February 15.

The home placement committee is now checking on possible homes where the students may live. There are rather stringent requirements in the selection of a home. Among them of course, being that the family must be willing to take a foreign student into their home, and treat this student as a full fledged family member, and provide for the support of that student while he is in Rialto. In the home where the student resides, both parents must be over 37 years of age, the student should preferably have his own bedroom, and the mother in the home cannot be working.

I know it will be a very gratifying experience for all of us here at Eisenhower to have one or two foreign students on our campus during the next school year. All of us will have a big job in mak-
