MARINE CORPS OFFERS NEW PROGRAM

Master Sergeant Don Myers the local Marine Corps recruiter announced today a new plan offered by the Marine Corps. It is known as the "120 day delay program." This is a four fold plan designed especially for High School Seniors. Commencing February 17, 1962 any Senior can now enlist in the Marine Corps and choose a date he would like to go on active duty within 120 days after his enlistment. This means a qualified young man can enlist now and go on active duty after he graduates. By doing this he makes his time count "Double" as he is finishing school.

Trash Problem Out of Hand

Papers, cartons, sacks, and food boy, it's all over our campus! Remember we are judged on the neatness of our school grounds.

I know — harp, harp, harp, that's all you ever hear is: Keep the campus clean, Stash your trash, and all the other slogans adopted to call attention to the campus campaign.

But this is important to the reputation of our school. We are in competition with San Bernardino and Pacific High Schools. So far we have won the clean campus contest three times, Pacific twice, and SBHS once.

The advantages of this four fold program are: (1) Go on active duty with your first pay increase (a man must be in the Marine Corps four months in order to get his first increase). (2) This time will benefit him for his first promotion (6 months as a Private is usually necessary to qualify for the first promotion). (3) This time he serves while finishing school counts towards fulfilling his military privilege, and (4) If he enlists now knows he is gualified and will have the necessary mental tests and physical exams out of the way and can go on active duty when he chooses.

This year Sergeant Myers announced, the San Bernardino recruiting office will be forming a San Bernardino County Squad. Any men interested in after February 17, 1962 thru graduation will have the opportunity to go as a squad from San Bernardino. This means that this squad will all go thru their basic training together. This would also mean that these men would be home on their 20 day leaves after training together.

Eagles Jolt Chino, Soren, Lucas Lead Way

Led by Jack Lucas and a stand-out performance by Jim Soren, the Varsity cagers downed Chino 50-41 at the Pacific gym Tuesday.

The Eagles trailed 23-17 following a disastrous first half, in which Eisenhower failed to score for the first five minutes of the second quarter. Soren carried the bulk of the load during the early going, hitting well from the outside, but Chino's control of the boards slowed the Eagle attack.

A fired-up Eisenhower team took the floor in the third quarter and pulled within four points as Lucas started to hit well.

The fourth quarter was marked by wild action by both teams, which resulted in four fouls, the most called in an Eisenhower game to date.

Jim Soren caught fire midway through the fourth quarter, and hit for six straight points to give Ike a lead they held the

BASKETBALL Homecoming - 19

In a head-on struggle for Tri-County League basketball supremacy, Eisenhower's "Go-Go" Eagles duel old nemesis and traditional rival, the Falcons from Rubidoux, in the Pacific High gym, tonight.

Coach John Dowd's fast break tactics, led by his senior scoring duo of Jack Lucas and Jim Soren, have run up an astronomical 60 points per game average in winning two consecutive league contests and 7 of 9 overall. On the other hand, the up-and-down invaders from Southeast Riverside boast a spotty 7-5 record despite being everybody's pick for the TCL crown after dumping vast Ramona by ten, 49-39.

In an earlier meeting, Ramona demolished lke 73-59.

Chino Chews Bees, 60 - 29

Chino's talented Cowboy Bees put a display of red hot shooting from 20 and 25 feet out, to hand Coach Earl Nesse's winless Baby Eagles their seventh successive defeat, by a whopping 60-29 count.

Little John Powers, one of the four sophomore starters, popped in 12 points in a one-man shooting spree. Again Steve Kelley and Gary Mills monopolized the boards, but the scoring punch was lacking as Terry Cowart, who hit for 14 at Corona, was held to 2.

In the waning minutes, Coach Nesse—whose only comment was "We lost by more than we scored!" — unloaded and cleared his bench. Soren and Bruce Bartells at guard, Lucas and Terry McDonald at forewards; all seniors, and sophomore Bill Potter or his alternate, ASB President Guy Hogle, at center.

Tuesday, the Eagles took a comefrom-behind 50-41 triumph in a foulfilled, near brawl that was far closer than the nine point margin would show. Soren, who at one point scored six straight and had the wildly partisan crowd in a near uproar, combined with Lucas for 38 points, and 46 the Friday before. Bartells, whose defensive work was all but phenomenal for a 5-9 guard, added 8 more.

Rams Belt JV's 68 - 35

Our out-of-practice JV's succumbed to the powerful Ramona Rams 68-35. Having only one practice under their belts was bound to have had an affect on the outcome, as well as the fact that first string center, Danny Roberts, was out with blisters.

Ramona jumped out to a 15-5 lead in the first quarter and stretched it to 28-14 at the half, despite the hard-nosed defense of Wayne Haggard.

Fred Cowart was the Eagle high scorer with 11 followed by Haggard with 6 and Van Dunlop with 5.

The Rams' Erger was the game's high scorer with 15.

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
