Seniors Represent Ike at Boys' State

This summer Don Campbell and John Grenfell were chosen to represent Eisenhower in the annual "Boy's Day" outing sponsored by the American Legion.

The legion paid the boys' way to and from the Sacramento fair grounds where they lived in a cowbarn, sleeping on cots for eight wildly educating days.

All the boys were divide into cities and counties, fifty boys to a city and three cities compromising each county.

Elections Held

City elections were held first, followed by county elections, with the boys running for the office of their choice.

After the victorius candidates had served their terms of office (4 days), state elections were staged. Don Campbell was elected to the post of Fire Chief in the city elections and County Hiway commissioner in the county election. John Grenfell held down the job of California Code Commissioner on the state level.

Besides learning how the California government was operated, and how it functioned, the boys participated in the many sport activities offered, visited the Capitol buildings and Fort Sutter, and received certificates for being selected in their "campaigns."

Rea Attends Girls State

Representing Eisenhower, Senior Stevie Rea attended Girls State, held at the University of California at Davis, June 22 through July 1.

Girls State is sponsored and financed each year by the American Legion Woman's Auxiliary. The purpose of Girls State is to give girls a better understanding of city, county, and state government through actual experience.

The 557 Girl Staters were divided into 16 cities of 35 girls each. Four cities formed a county. The two political parties were the Whigs and the Tories.

Colton Convicts

Stevie was a citizen of the "Colton Convicts." She was on her city's election board, and Chaplain of the State Assembly. She assisted her city editor with the "After dinner Post," a newspaper published every evening.

Whig Elected Governor

For the 15th consecutive year, a Whig was elected governor. She and her opponent, who was elected "Outstanding Citizen" will represent California at Girls Nation.

Activities included swimming, volleyball, writing to members of Boys State, and being ambushed by part of the Davis male student body.

When asked what impressed her most, Stevie replied, "The girls... They were all really fabulous. Another thing was the tremendous spirit that everyone displayed, and their willingness to work together."

Ware Returns From AFS Trip; Tells of Life in Switzerland

Eisenhower's first exchange student to go overseas, Marybeth Ware, is back at home. A little travel-weary, but otherwise fine, Marybeth took time out to answer questions about her summer stay in Schaffhausen, Switzerland.

Contrary to the beliefs of may Americans, Switzerland is not entirely made up of snow-covered Alps and yodeling goatherds. Schaffhausen, in fact is not in the Alps at all but is situated among rolling green hills. And, while there are cows aplenty, complete with picturesque Swiss cowbells, Marybeth testifies that she never saw a goat. Even the Alps themselves are not like our conception of mountains. While our San Bernardino mountains are covered by forests, the Swiss mountains are almost all meadow land, with patches and strips of forest growing at random.

Swiss Families

European families, too, are not as strict as Americans often picture them. In Switzerland, as in most of Europe, smoking and drinking are permitted and accepted among teenagers. "But," Marybeth adds, "the Swiss kids never take advantage of this."

Dating customs are much like those in United States, Marybeth relates, except that the boys do not drive cars. Swiss teenagers walk to the cinema or to parties. In Shaffhausen, a favorite gathering - place is the "munot" a Medieval

fortress converted into a sort of club where dances are held every few weeks. Other favorite forms of recreation are waling, swimming and singing.

Teens Enjoy Singing

"Teens tend more to informal group activities rather than constantly pairing off," says Marybeth. "They
