Eisenhower to Have Pool

During the latter part of last year, Rialto voters were asked to vote on a proposed bond issue to raise sufficient funds for the construction of a swimming pool on Eisenhower's campus. This proposal, however, was defeated.

At this time, it appears that a pool and/or stadium may be built due to a recently applied tax that allows for a rate of 10 cents per \$1,000. Presently, the city is collecting only 3 cents on the aforementioned tax. "This increase," states Dr. James R. **Duran, Assistant Superintendent** of the Rialto Unified School District, "will allow for a pool within the next five years."

Dr. Duran continued, "The School Board will meet after two years to decide whether the money will be raised in what would be considered a reasonable amount of time.

He further stated that this tax increase would net approximately thirty-five to forty thousand dollars the first year. While this is not enough for either one of the projects, it is believed that an accumulation over a period of years might eventually make both projects feasible.






