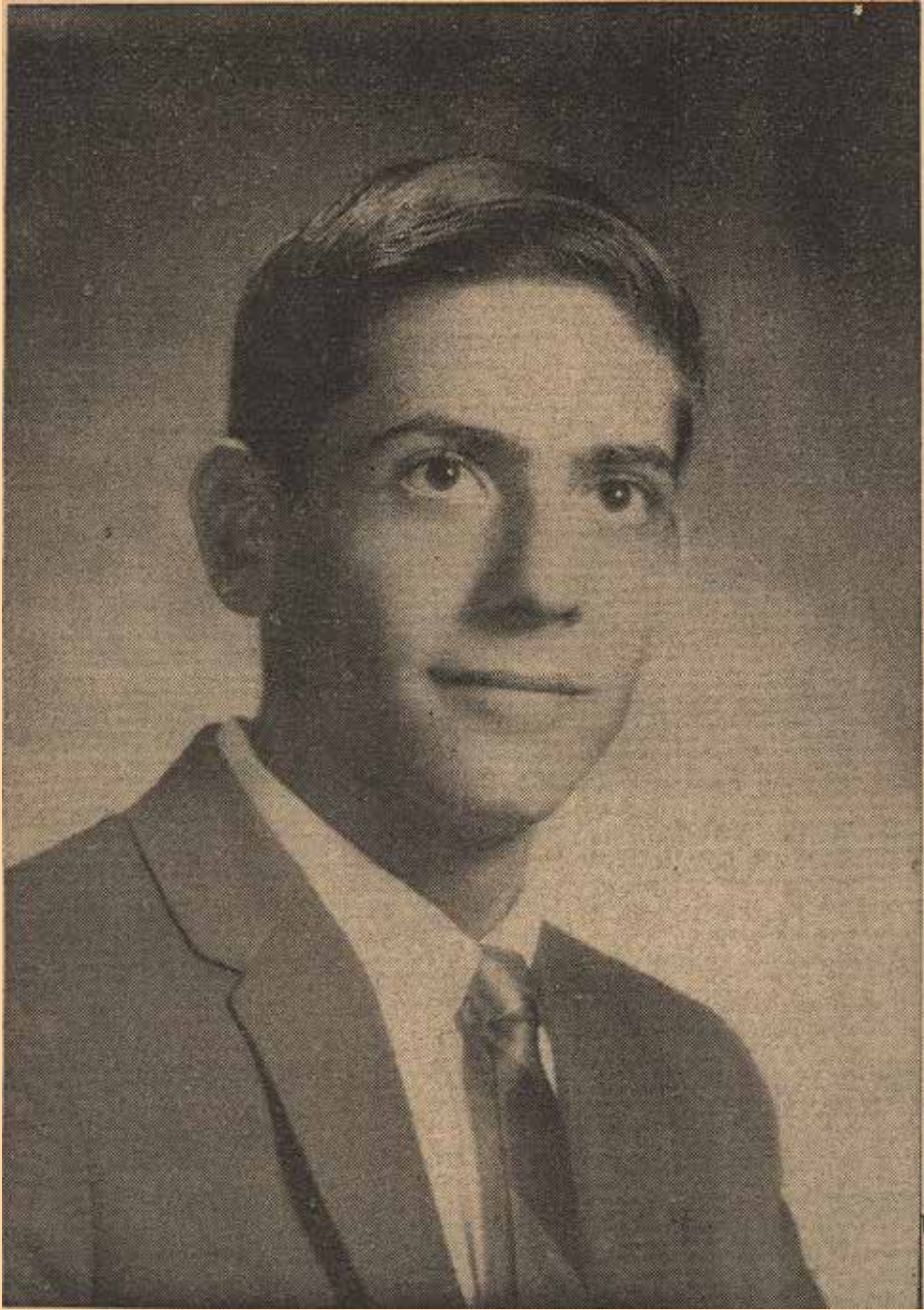

"I'll Remember All Of You . . ."

This year, Eisenhower High School was privileged to have two foreign exchange students from Europe. They were Genevieve Cottet from France and Jean Rey from Switzerland.

Genevieve Cottet from Montpelier in France arrived in New York on August 14th, 1965 after an eight hour jet flight from Paris. Following a one day rest in New York, Genevieve boarded another jet for a twelve hour trip to Los Angeles International Airport where she united with her American parents, Mr. and Mrs.

Genevieve is active in many clubs and organizations on campus, including Azorettes, AFS, French Club, and Student Council. Another interest of Genevieve is football. "It's so neat. Everybody is so excited and you always want your boys to win! I like baseball too. I went to a Dodger game and it was really neat!" said Genevieve. The native sport of France is Rugby or soccer. Rugby is like football only "you play with our foot and try to put the ball between two poles." In France, said Genevieve, people place bets on the winners of Rugby, just as people make bets at the horse track here in the United States. When asked about American slang, Genevieve bubbled, "It was

funny! I couldn't understand any slang and expressions." However, Genevieve added "I've picked up some good slang! Ing'H eroc alvny osnobi ar'w slang!" Her vocabulary is now filled with such American expressions as "neat, sharp, swell tough, and nut."

According to Genevieve, there are quite a few differences between the graduation procedures of French and American schools. Genevieve's high school, Lycee du Mas de Tesse, determine the graduation by giving a huge exam at the end of the twelve years of high school. "It lasts three days and is over everything you have ever learned. If you pass it, you can go onto college, and if not, you take your senior year all over again," stated the French miss. The differences are that there aren't as many activities and as many clubs, assemblies and dances. The school course is laid out for you, and the teachers are very formal and strict. Genevieve enjoys all the activities here at Eisenhower and maintains quite a busy schedule. Her most exciting experience here in America was she said, "I think it's going to be the Prom!"

Genevieve's future plans are to go to Business College to be a private secretary. She will use her experience in German, English and French in this field and before getting too involved in studies, she wants "to learn Italian."

This summer, she will return to France and her family, which consists of her parents, two brothers, and two sisters, three of which are married. Her father was in the French army and retired two years ago. In closing, Genevieve said, "I am very happy to have spent this wonderful year in Rialto, and I want to thank every person who has made my stay here possible. I loved Eisenhower High School and my stay here was one of the most exciting events in my life. I am going to leave soon but I'll remember all of you all my life."

Another exchange student was Jean-Claude Rey from Oulensur-Moudon, near Lusanne in Switzerland.

Jean gave a clear account of his arrival in the United States. "I arrived at New York the 4th of September at 5:00 a.m. coming from Milano by a Pan Am DC-8. Then there was two days in New York, hanging around the Empire State

and the UN buildings. It was the first contact with eggs-and-bacon and jam breakfast, the first French looking English words I ever spoke. What a mess! It wasn't better after a five days bus trip through back Pennsylvania, sunny Arkansas and tourist Southern California."

When asked about sports in the United States, Jean replied, "The opportunities for sports around here are wonderful. I sure enjoyed goofing around with the wrestling team, learning how to water ski, wondering about the rah rah rah of the football games. The first reaction was "Are they some kind of nuts" and the second one is to cheer out loud!" In Switzerland, the natives and tourists engage in soccer, skiing and mountain climbing.

Besides taking an interest in sports, Jean is active in many organizations here at "Ike" including the Key Club, French Club, AFS, and Student Council. His most exciting experience in the United States was "probably a weekend in Yosemite." He also included San Francisco and surfing among his favorite experiences.

According to Jean, Swiss schools, like Genevieve's, are quite different from those of the U.S. Only five to seven per cent of Swiss youngsters go to high school. "The courses are chosen for you," says Jean and the students attend school, about forty hours a week, the hours being from eight to twelve, or two five each morning and afternoon. The teachers, as in France, are very strict and formal. Graduations is determined by a three week examination, after which Baccalaureate and the receiving of the diploma follow.

As for his future, Jean commented, "I'm going to teach for two months and go to college to get a French Literature major." This summer, Jean will depart from Rialto and the United States to return to his family, consisting of his two parents and a sister, 18 and a brother, 12. His father is a farmer. His U.S. family has been Mr. and Mrs. Roger Birdsall, daughter, Susan and brother Steve. In closing, Jean said, "This year has been real great. I made

a lot of friends of any kind, and in Eisenhower, there are a lot of funny, serious, naughty and cool boys and girls. It makes life around real fun!" All of us on the Eagle's Eye staff and in Rialto wish Jean and Genevieve the best of luck in all their future endeavors.
