MAINTENANCE III - CARPENTER

DEFINITION

Under direction of the Maintenance Supervisor, performs skilled carpentry work in the alteration, repair and construction of school facilities and structures; performs semi-skilled and skilled tasks in other maintenance trade areas; performs other related work as required and/or assigned.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES

- alters, repairs, inspects, and constructs articles and structures of wood, including partitions, counters, doors, window frames, scaffolds, concrete forms, and fences; builds closets, stairways, bookcases, and shelving
- constructs and repairs furniture, equipment and wooden fixtures; performs mill and cabinet work
- lavs and repairs floors and floor tiles
- fits and installs doors, windows, sashes, and screens
- operates saws, lathes, planers, shapers, joiners, sanders, band saws and other woodworking equipment
- sharpens, maintains, and services hand and machine tools and various woodworking equipment
- performs glazing and roof repair functions
- plans, organizes, and lays out assigned tasks, coordinates projects with other maintenance personnel, estimates labor and material costs
- prepares requisitions, orders, and maintains an adequate inventory of supplies and materials
- drives a service vehicle to and from work sites
- may perform minor concrete, plaster, rough electrical, plumbing, drywall, and painting repairs on alteration projects

QUALIFICATIONS

<u>Knowledge of</u>: Materials, tools, and procedures used in performing a variety of rough and finish carpentry, roof repairs and wall board installation; basic qualities and uses of woods and other related construction materials; building code requirements and the requirements of the State Architectural Service pertaining to school facility construction, maintenance and repair; safe working methods and procedures.

<u>Ability to</u>: Skillfully use and maintain tools and equipment in performing rough and finished carpentry, glazing, and roof repair; plan, organize, and lay out carpentry tasks; accurately estimate labor costs and materials; work from blueprints, shop drawings, and sketches; maintain simple records and prepare complete and concise reports; understand and follow oral and written directions; establish and maintain cooperative working relationships.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS

The physical requirements indicated below are examples of the physical aspects that this position classification must perform in carrying out essential job functions:

- will frequently exert 75 to 100 pounds of force to lift, carry, push, pull, or otherwise move objects
- will walk or stand for extended periods of time; will occasionally be required to bend, stoop, crouch, kneel, reach above shoulder level, and/or to ascend and descend a step stool or step ladder, stairs, scaffolding, and ramps
- must possess the ability to hear and perceive the nature of sound
- must possess visual acuity and depth perception
- must be able to provide oral information, both in person and over the telephone and other communication devices
- must possess the manual dexterity to operate hand tools and related equipment, and to handle and work with various materials and objects
- may be occasionally exposed to hot, cold, wet, humid, or windy conditions caused by weather

Reasonable accommodation may be made to enable a person with a disability to perform the essential functions of the job.

EXPERIENCE AND EDUCATION

Experience: A minimum of four years of paid journey level carpenter experience within the last ten years.

<u>Education</u>: Verification of a High School diploma, a GED certificate, or a higher degree; supplemental specific training in the carpentry trade is desirable.

<u>License Requirement</u>: Verification of the possession of a valid California Motor Vehicle Operator's License.

<u>Condition of Employment</u>: May require Insurability by the District's liability insurance carrier. Finalists scheduled for an interview must provide a current DMV printout (not more than 30 days old) prior to the interview.
