

MAINTENANCE III – PAINTER

DEFINITION

Under the direction of the Maintenance Supervisor, performs skilled work in painting, redecorating, and surface preparation; performs semi-skilled and skilled functions in other maintenance trade areas; and performs other related work as assigned and/or required.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES

- uses a brush, roller, or spray equipment in applying paint, varnish, shellac, enamel, lacquer, and other protective and decorative finishes to a variety of surfaces, including wood, metal, glass, plaster, stucco, wallboard, brick, and cement
- scrapes, sands, and fills voids to prepare surfaces for painting or repainting
- applies undercoat and finish coats to a variety of surfaces
- seals plaster, stucco, masonry walls and other surfaces from water intrusion
- prepares walls and repairs vinyl wall coverings
- refinishes furniture, lockers, automotive, and general equipment
- erects, rigs, moves, and works from scaffolding, platforms, ladders and man-lifts
- cleans brushes and tools and maintains a variety of spray painting equipment
- paints simple signs and affixes them to appropriate structures and designated areas
- mixes paints, matches blends, harmonizes and contrasts colors
- lays out and paints athletic courts and playground surfaces
- plans, organizes, and lays out painting related tasks
- may occasionally operate sandblasting and paint removal equipment
- requisitions and maintains an adequate inventory of paint, supplies, materials, and equipment
- coordinates and directs the work of other maintenance personnel
- drives a service vehicle to and from work sites

QUALIFICATIONS

Knowledge of: Methods, materials, tools, and equipment used in painting, tinting, and finish work; methods of preparing different surfaces for painting and repainting; safe working methods and procedures.

Ability to: Skillfully mix paint, match colors, prepare and paint walls, and repair wall coverings; safely erect and work from riggings and scaffolding; plan, lay out, and coordinate the work of others; accurately estimate labor and material costs; maintain paint usage and waste records, and prepare complete and concise reports; understand and follow oral and written directions; establish and maintain cooperative working relationships.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS

The physical requirements indicated below are examples of the physical aspects that the position classification must perform in carrying out essential job functions.

- will frequently exert 50 to 75 pounds of force to lift, carry, push, pull, or otherwise move objects
- will involve walking or standing for extended periods of time, and may involve ascending and descending ladders, stairs, scaffolding, and ramps
- must be capable of perceiving the nature of sound
- must possess visual acuity and depth perception
- must be capable of providing oral information, both in person and over the telephone and other communication devices
- must possess the manual dexterity to operate equipment and use hand tools, and handle and work with various materials and objects
- exposure to hot, cold, wet, humid, or windy conditions caused by weather may occasionally be experienced.

Reasonable accommodation may be made to enable a person with a disability to perform the essential functions of the job.

EXPERIENCE AND EDUCATION

Experience: A minimum of three years paid, journey level painter experience within the last ten years. Completion of a formal apprenticeship in the painting trade is desirable.

Education: Verification of a High School diploma, a GED certificate, or a higher degree, supplemental course work or training in industrial painting methods and techniques is desirable.

License Requirement: Possession of a valid California Motor Vehicle Operator's License.

Condition of Employment: May require insurability by the District's liability insurance carrier.
Finalists scheduled for an interview must provide a current DMV printout (not more than 30 days old) prior to the interview.
