- Governor Brown signed Assembly Bill 1808 into law on June 27, 2018.
- AB 1808 authorizes the allocation of a \$300 million **Low-Performing Students Block Grant (LPSBG)** in the 2018–19 fiscal year to provide California’s low-performing students with additional supports to increase their academic achievement as defined in California *Education Code* 41570(d).

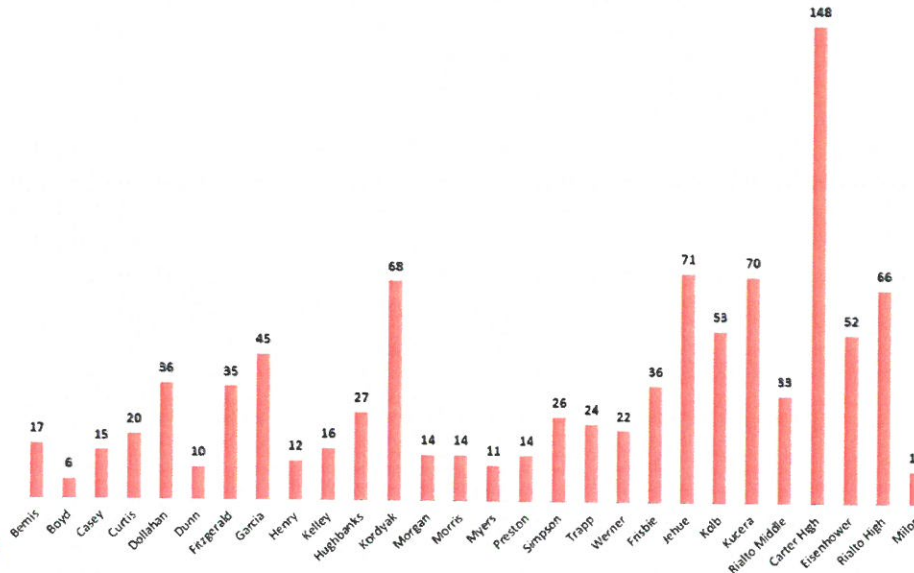

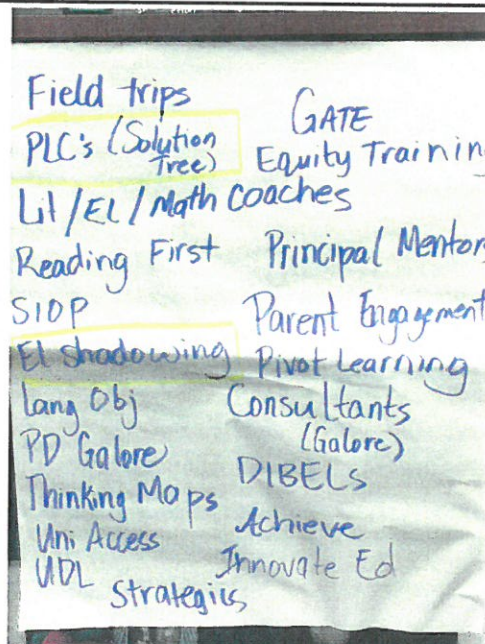

- How will the effectiveness of the evidence-based services be measured?
- How are services aligned with and described in the LEA's local control and accountability plan?

Required Report Number Two: On or before November 1, 2021, all eligible LEAs that have accepted LPSBG funds are required to report to the State Superintendent regarding the implementation of the plan, the strategies used, and whether those strategies increased the academic performance of the pupils identified.
