Meals prepared in 60 seconds.

Cars that don't need steering, clothes that don't need laundering, these are only a few astounding samples of your everyday living in the decade ahead.

We have been living in this exciting new decade for a little more than three weeks now and already we've seen it's going to be quite an era indeed!! During its course, your life will be radically changed for the better in a thousand ways.

Some of these products and services will take longer to arrive than others. A few will be available this year or next. Many important ones will be here by the time your children are born in 1970 or sooner. Here's a sneak preview of your tomorrow:

WAKE UP IN DREAMLAND:

You wake up in the home of tomorrow—which will be a far cry from the immobile and fairly permanent abode of 1959. One of the most popular models is a manufactured house of panels, so that you can change its shape to suit your needs, move it easily to another part of the country or just about do anything you want with it.

AND LIGHT UP THE WALL:

Light bulbs are a relic of the past. Lighting comes from colored electroluminescent panels occupying most of the ceiling and side walls of a room. Illumination is some ten to twenty times as bright as home lighting in the 50's, but glare is eliminated by polarization. Some of your appliances, housewives of the future, will work without moving parts.

A FINGER OPENS THE WINDOW:

Your home is completely air-conditioned and, using a heat pump, the same system cools the house in summer and heats it in winter. Your windows and doors, with self-cleaning surfaces, are kept closed and you don't want to open them—there's no need to. The air indoors is mountain fresh, electrostatically stripped of every particle of dust. If you do insist on opening a window, you just push a button or

point a finger in the right direction.

Of course the house is completely soundproofed. A built-in intercom system is the substitute for grandmother's calling.

AND A BUTTON LET'S THE CAT OUT: A small box about a foot square, in your front hall, is the electronic control center of the house. It turns on the panel lighting when you enter a room, maintains a comfortable temperature in every room and figures out your monthly bill, (so maybe girl's math isn't as important as the teachers say). It turns on the heat conductors under your driveway whenever it snows, waters the lawn and changes the swimming pool water. It wakes you up with your own music (even ancient rock and roll, if you prefer) starts the coffee, warms up the car and lets the cat in.

YOUR CAR DRIVES YOU: If it's a working day—and it won't be many years before your children will be reading that their parents in the "olden days" had a 6-day working week, will be laughing since their's is only 4 days a week. You start for the office. Your town car of the future gets its power with little noise and no fumes from a fuel cell.
