Hi again! Say did you know that when you apply make-up in the correct usage you're working just like an artist. By the time you get through you have a very pretty picture IF you use your wise judgment.

Getting color on your lips is not enough. Your lips and lipstick should be given as much thought and care as you give your complexion or your hair style.

Your lips tell a story, as do your eyes, about your personality, and improving the shape, as well as the shades you select, could happily change your life. Analyze the shape of your lips by asking yourself these questions.

Controlled shaping of the lips requires a lipstick brush, but with a little practice you'll have beautiful lips and wonder why you didn't do this sooner. With the following directions you will learn quick-

ly how simple it really is!

(1) Be sure your lips are free of moisture and traces of lipstick.

(2) Fill brush with lipstick.

(3) Parting the lips and using the flat side of the bristles, draw the contour of the shape desired on the upper lip first and fill color in smoothly. Then do the same with the lower lip.

(4) Always wipe brush clean with a tissue when you are finished.

Fashion demands that women stay alert color-wise, from head to toe. So much so, that, many times, it's just one touch of the right color on the lips that "makes" an outfit.

It is necessary too, to have more than one shade. Your lipstick shades should harmonize with your fabrics, and as you grow more conscious of color, you will want a selection of colors for day and for evening.
