Fads and Fashions

From a beauty standpoint your hands are the most vulnerable part of your body. And this is for two reasons: First, they dehydrate most quickly because they have less natural oil; and second, they are so very active.

It seems as if everyone has the same basic problems with their hands. First of all, dry hands: They need moisturizing. Often because your hands don't absorb as readily as the rest of your skin. A good idea as you wash your hands is to use a little water softener in tepid water. Then with a mild soap and hand brush, work up a lather on the brush. With the brush, massage the lather over your hands and around your wrist. Rinse thoroughly with tepid water, pat dry, and moisturize them well. A help for very dry hands is therapeutic gloves; the heat aids absorption.

The second problem is nails that split and break. The two main causes of brittle nails are injury and diet deficiency. Nails are often injured by unskillful manicuring with a metal instrument, filing the shoulder of the nail too close, and indiscriminate use in household chores. Diet will do a lot to prevent nail-splitting. Your nail beauty diet should include diets with lots of vitamin A and liver, celery, citrus fruits, grapes, honey. And if you'll take a package of unflavored gelatin (or gelatin capsules) daily for a few months, the results will show stronger, better and faster growing nails. You'll find many good products on the market to protect nails.

The third problem is chapped hands. The main cause of this

are weather and wash basin damage. Put some soothing lotion on your hands as often as you can. When you apply it, don't just pat it on haphazardly. Knead it on, and wash your hands as infrequently as possible.

Then, too, a weekly hand treatment with a cosmetic face cream will help. Massage this thoroughly into your hands, wrists (and even your elbows while you're at it). Leave it on for an hour or so. It will bring up the circulation and counteract dryness. And wear gloves, of course, when you go out into cold weather.

The fourth and most popular problem is nail-biting. More people than you imagine are nail-biters. And if you're conscious of your nails, and feel you are showing them off, it will go a long way toward preventing you from spoiling them. Try this: Make yourself get a weekly manicure for a month. Then splurge on some of the gay nail polishes.

Saturday, November 29, Eisenhower's high-flying Eagles took another giant step in quest of the C.I.F. small-schools championship. Sparked by the running of Walt Meers, John Benson, and Jack Viero, the Eagles fought their way into the C.I.F. Semi-Finals.

The first two times the Ike-ites got their hands on the ball, they scored. The first touchdown came on a 31-yard run by Meers. Meers then scored the extra point.

It took the Eagles just nine plays to go 88 yards for the second touchdown. The pay-off came when Duane White connected with Jerry Koch for 22 yards and the touchdown. Meers went over tackle for the extra point.

The second half was little different. Benson took the kickoff and returned it 48 yards to the Black-Foxe 17. Black-Foxe held and took over on downs. It took Black-Foxe 17 plays to go 83 yards for its only touchdown.

The Eagles matched the Black-Foxe touchdown, going 63 yards in 11 plays for the insurance touchdown. Benson and Viero set up a one-yard pay-off plunge by Meers. Viero rolled out for the extra point.

Black-Foxe tried to come back late in the game, but Duane White intercepted a Black-Foxe pass and returned it 52 yards.

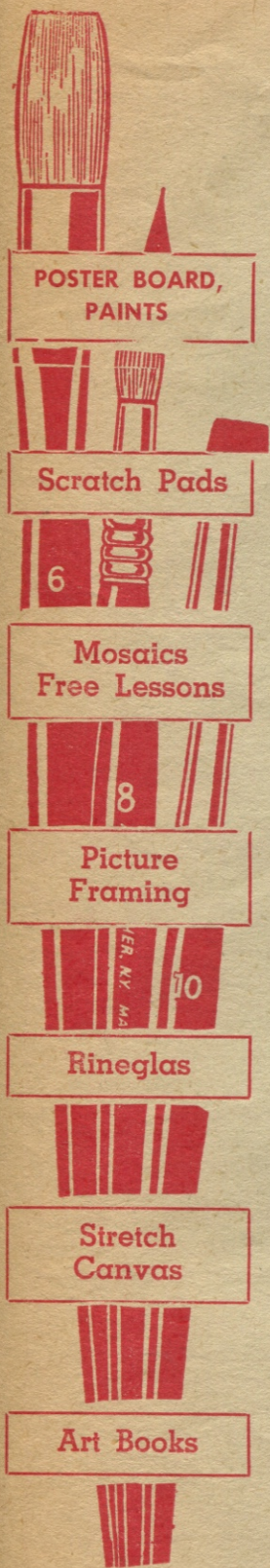

The name Troubadours was used in the 13th and 14th century. Troubadours were minstrel singers that originated in Provence, France.

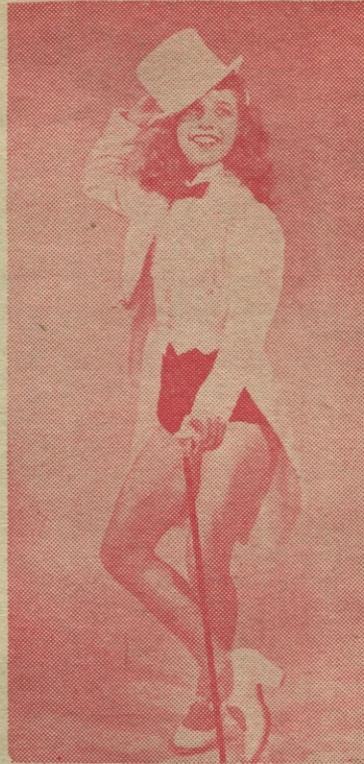
The Troubadours are also going to go Christmas Caroling with all of the vocal groups at school.
