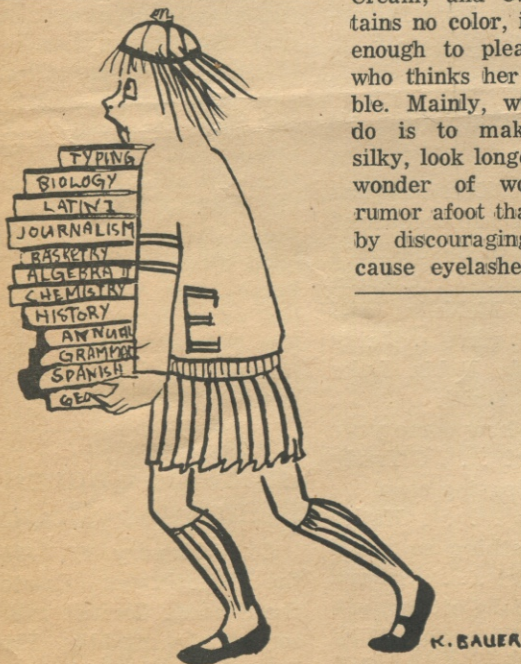

Track Season Gets Under Way

On Monday, February 1, the first Eisenhower track season got under way. As usual there are a few complications in getting the season under way. The biggest being the fact that the track is not completed. Coach Matuschka said he expects the track to be complete toward the end of the week. The track is made up of decomposed granite and a clay mix. It will be one of the country's finest tracks.

"Contrary to football, we have the equipment and are ready to go," said Coach Matuschka. The uniforms and sweat suits are green with white. Also, the track team will be furnished with track shoes. Eisenhower is the only school in the system that provides shoes for the cinder-men.

With the first track meet only four weeks away, Coach Matuschka has some cause to worry. The reason, only about 12 boys showed up for the first practice. The track schedule is as follows;

Then the Eagles went to Yucaipa where they were again shot down. This time to the tune of 64-52.

The following Tuesday the Eagles came home to gain

their first victory 32-22 at the expense of the Scots from Rim of the World High.

The Eagles then met Aquinas on the Pacific boards and fell 42-22.

Big Bear came to meet the Eagles the following Tuesday. This time downing the Eagles 49-43 on the S.B.H.S. courts. This was the first game for the boys who played football.

After the tournament, the Eagles clawed the Desert High Scorpions 56-44.

The following week the Eagles downed San Jacinto, 45-43 and fell to Rubidoux, 41-40.

The Eagles again did battle with the Tigers from San Jacinto, this time downing them 46-39 at S.B.H.S.

The Eagles then went to the mountains, where they once again clawed the Rim High Scots. This time the score was 56-29.

Then came homecoming, which saw Valerie Perrault crowned queen and also the Eagles downing the Burroughs High Burros, 40-37.

In their last outing, the Eagles went into the Banning tournament. Here they posted a 0-2 record. Their first loss was at the hands of their host, Banning, 46-34. Their second was to Brawley High, 52-35.
