

Bi-Weekly Meeting Held Annual Staff Reports

The senior high held its bi-weekly meeting March 8, 1960. The Presidential Cab-

net met to discuss the House of Representatives, the lunch line, Secretary of Assemblies, the financial matters and the Saint Patrick's Dance.

Secretary of Activities Kathy Fergusson, and Secretary of Promotions Penny Bunce brought up to the council the problem concerning assemblies.

The problem was that the job of supervising assemblies was a full time job according to Kathy and Penny. A motion was made that starting next year a new elective office would be put on the council and would carry a full vote. To follow this process the constitution would have to be amended. Since the Presidential Cabinet does not have full power of attorney to amend the constitution. Therefore the council could only table the issue until the next meeting which will be on Thursday of the same week.

The next pressing issue on the agenda was the problem existing in the cafeteria lines at the senior high lunch hour. A.S.B. President, Ernie Cresswell, proposed a plan that the student council members pass out numbers to the students in the lunch lines. Each number would be consecutive and one could not buy his lunch unless his number was consecutive of the previous number. The numbers would then be collected by the cashier.

The Secretary of Interior, Ted Easterling gave a brief reminder to the cabinet members that March 8—would be the first official meeting of the newly formed House of Representatives. The meeting was held in Rialto at 7:30.

Most of the new work on the annual, AQUILA, is still "classified information," or top secret. However, the staff has volunteered a little few new developments, which are:

EHS Holds Scholarship Assembly

The first scholarship assembly was held at Eisenhower on March 7 at 2 o'clock. The assembly featured Dr. Arthur Bietz, a psychologist and professor at the CMME Medical Center in Los Angeles. His speech was received and was very well titled, "Your Future Is Up to You."

"Both your future and that of your community and country depends on the work you put into it." He developed this point further by saying "that the country needed more mature, intelligent people." The doctor said, "You are the architect of your life—plan it before you build it. This will take thinking," he continued, "more than just a rearrangement of your prejudices." He stressed doing work that measures up to the ability of the individual. Summarizing, he said that "your plan for life should be set up early, not dissuaded by sidewalk superintendents, and should utilize your energy toward a constructive goal. High ideals are necessary—also initiative and control. These are the most important.

The meeting was opened by President Ernie Cresswell, with the flag salute. Mr. E. Ryan, principal, welcomed the audience, followed by an introductory speech by Mr. Merle Rickerman. The assembly was concluded at 3 o'clock.
