FOUR IN PRESIDENTIAL RACE

The 1961-62 ASB, primary elections will be Tuesday, April 25 and Monday, May 8, for class officers. The intents to run have been filed and also cleared by the Eligibility Committee. Petitions containing 60 valid signatures must be filed with the vice principal during the week of April 17-

Registration of voters will be on Monday, April 24 for ASB offices and Friday, May 5, for class offices. After the candidate assemblies, the general ASB elections will be held Results of the elections will be announced after returns are tallied. If a person is defeated in the ASB elections, he may file an intent to run for a class office within two days after the General election.

All campaign materials and speeches must be in support of candidates and cannot be derogatory of an opponent .Posters and campaign materials must be approved by the election committee or vice principal. No posters are to be in classrooms or in the library and any damage to campus in placing or removing posters will be the responsibility of (Continued on Page Two)



EAGLES EYE JOURNALISTS SPEND "DAY IN THE NAVY"

Two students and one teacher from here went aboard the Yorktown and spent a day in the navy. Roy R. Kallas, Allen L. Richardson and Mr. Richard Bristow. Bristow arrived at Long Beach on March 27. They arrived at 12 noon and registered at the Long Beach Naval Station. They then took a bus to the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Yorktown. Here is an account of their adventures as told by them:

MY EXPERIENCES By Allen L. Richardson

The event started on March 27, with dinner at Long Beach Naval Station. That night we bunked on the Yorktown with the enlisted men.

The next morning I got up at 6 o'clock and ate another navy meal, which was fit for a king. Afterwards I witnessed an exercise in the destruction of mines and gunfire. The mines amazed me particularly, because they were set off what seemed about a mile away and made the ship shake like a leaf. The ship is nearly three times the size of our football field.

After that exercise an exhibition of jet aircraft was performed. Then a small antisubmarine warfare exhibition demonstrated the effectiveness of teamwork which was the highlight of that afternoon.

MY EXPERIENCES By Roy Kallas

After registering and going to the ship, we were given our blanket and bunk bed. After going to ship were were taken on bus to a small boat where we were taken out and shown the island. We then went ashore to have dinner. When we got back we were shown a movie about the "Fighting Lady" (the nickname of the Yorktown). We went to bed
