At this time, the winners of the scholarships and the Olympic contest will be announced to the SSA Reporters present, including Jim Nedlik, of EHS. The SSA reporters have been voting all year on the outstanding players on their team, and their school's opponents' teams.

At the banquet, the SSA will present the largest prep trophy in the world, the Seth F. Van Patton Memorial Field of Sports trophy.
