# Ken Dyal Proposes Amendment

Recently the Eagle's Eye received the following letter from the House of Representatives:

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Ken W. Dyal, 33rd Dist., Calif., has introduced legislation proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States granting to citizens of the United States who have attained the age of eighteen the right to vote.

"Eighteen-year-old Americans deserve the right to vote, and this legislation is long overdue," the San Bernardino County Democrat said.

"President Johnson and the late President Kennedy urged Congress to lower the voting age to eighteen.

"Four states already have cut the voting age below 21. Georgia and Kentucky have gone 'all the way' to eighteen. Alaska grants 19-year-olds the vote, and Hawaii makes 20 the deciding age.

"My personal experience with the youth of San Bernardino County has inspired me to introduce this legislation. High school seniors and college students are a well informed group of citizens," Rep. Dyal continued.

"It will take several years for the constitutional amendment to pass," Rep. Dyal noted, "but we

have talked without action long enough. The youth of America, our finest national resources, has been forced to wait too long."

IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES September 14, 1966

Mr. Dyal introduced the following joint resolution; which was referred to the committee on the Judiciary

**JOINT RESOLUTION** Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States granting to citizens of the United States who have attained the age of eighteen the right to vote.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is hereby proposed as an amendment in the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution only if ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

"ARTICLE — "The right of citizens of the United States, who have reached the age of eighteen years, to vote

shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

The idea of lowering the voting age from 21 to 18 is not new but it has caused a great deal of interest and discussion of late. Congressman Dyal, as stated above, wishes to amend the Constitution, making it mandatory for all states to lower the voting age to 18, depriving the individual state of this long reserved right.

If Dyal doesn't succeed with his goal, the Golden State is seriously considering lowering the age on its own. One of the serious arguments for a younger voting age was summed up in an editorial in the Sun Telegram: "The majority of our Teen-Agers are outstanding young citizens—well informed on the events of the day, well versed on current local, national and international affairs, and definitely interested in the future of wonderful America. It certainly is safe to conclude that many young Americans are far better qualified to vote intelligently than their elders—many of whom are too complacent to vote on election day."

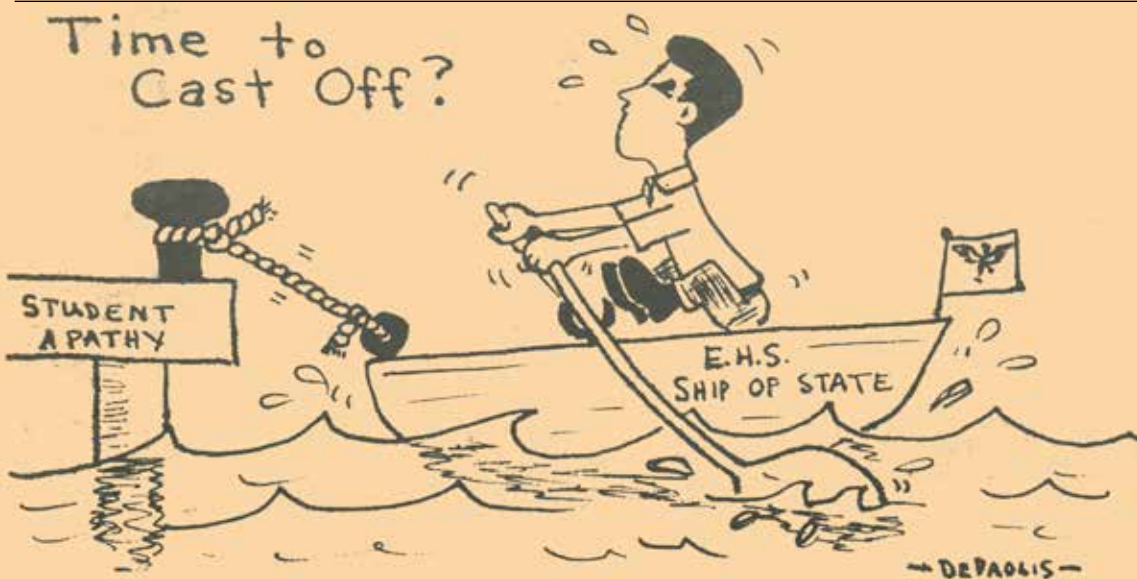

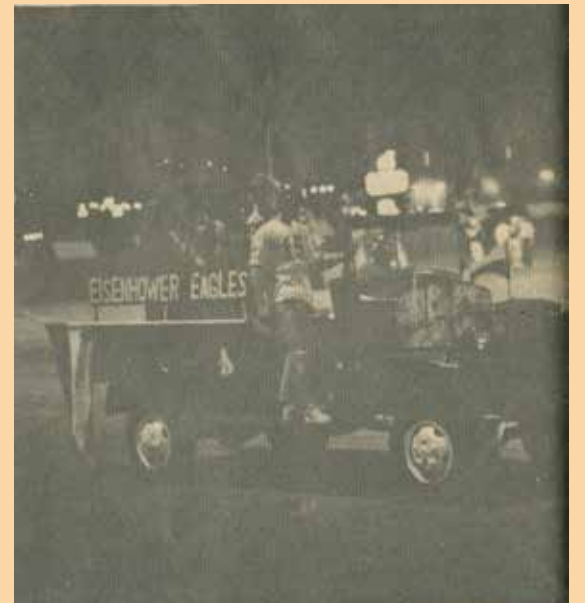
# Eagles Drop One To Spartans

The Sophomores won over Riverside Poly by a score of 35 to 31 and won by a forfeit over Corona 15 to 0. The top runner for the Eisenhower teams were Roger Thompson with a time of 11:04, followed by Richard Ponce, 11:13, Lester Byington, 11:36, Gary Frisbie, 11:41, Scot McAllister, the top JV runner with 11:50, Dave Mavity, 11:59, and Steve

Wilhite, 12:04. Larry Alejandro, 12:05 and Frank Adams, 12:06 were the top Sophomore men. The Sophomores all have a 4 and 0 record on the season.
