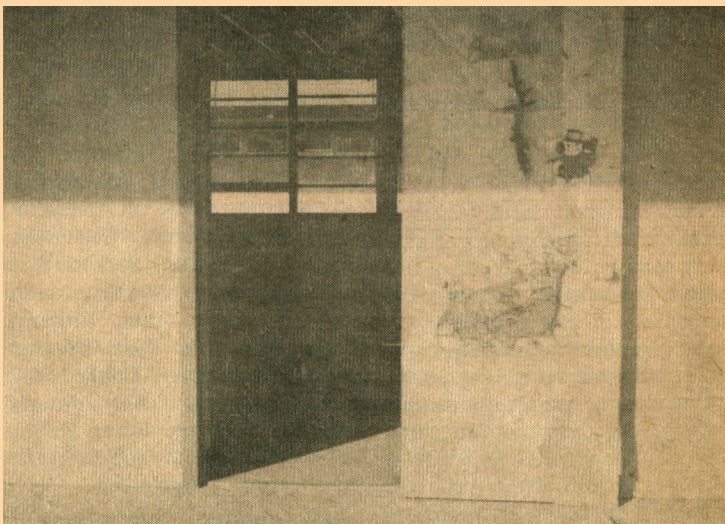
The second annual Door Decoration Contest was held again this year on December 15. Home room teachers were urged

Azorettes, the girls "social service" club at Eisenhower High School, has been more than busy with service projects for the holiday season.

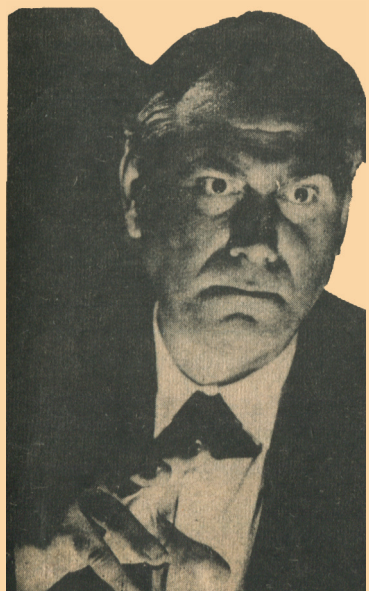

EHS Leaders Find IKE- "Not So Bad, After All"

Representing Eisenhower High School's Student Council, House of Representatives, Junior Class, annual, and student newspaper, 17 Eisenhower student-leaders, accompanied by Mr. Walter Wohlers, EHS Assistant Principal, traveled to Pasadena High School on Friday, December 2, to participate in a comparative conference with officers and commissioners of Pasadena's ASB Cabinet.

Upon arriving at Pasadena High School, Eisenhower's representatives were greeted by Robert Niemack, ASB President, who immediately escorted them to Pasadena's Student Council chambers. Following the introduction of Eisenhower's representatives, President Niemack called the December 2 meeting of Pasadena High School's ASB Cabinet to order.

Roll call was taken; the minutes were read; officers' reports were made; commissioners' reports were given; a request for old business was presented; resolutions were made; a request for new business was posed; announcements were given; and the meeting was adjourned.

Commented one EHS Council member, "At first glance Pasadena's campus was extremely impressive: two-story, ultra-modern classrooms; a huge, modern library; a professional-size auditorium; two heated swimming pools; a tremendously large gymnasium; a college-size campus. In comparison I thought that Eisenhower looked very bad. After close examination, however, I began to think differently."

Explained Mr. Walter Wohlers,

Eisenhower High School Assistant Principal, "Eisenhower's Student Council officers discovered that they have more power than they had realized. Without question Eisenhower's Council has greater control of the school's financial affairs than does Pasadena's Council.

Wohlers continued, "Although Pasadena High School has almost twice as many students as Eisenhower, it has no system of mass communication; the concept of an all-school inter-communications system has not yet been applied. Likewise, PHS has not yet proposed or considered a closed-circuit television station on campus. The greatest difference between Pasadena and Eisenhower, however, is that Pasadena has a drug and narcotics problem. In essence

At a recent House meeting, the representatives overwhelmingly vetoed any action by the Student Council to officially name the Sentetts winners in the homecoming float contest. of the group although Mike thinks he is suffering fro delusions of grandeur.

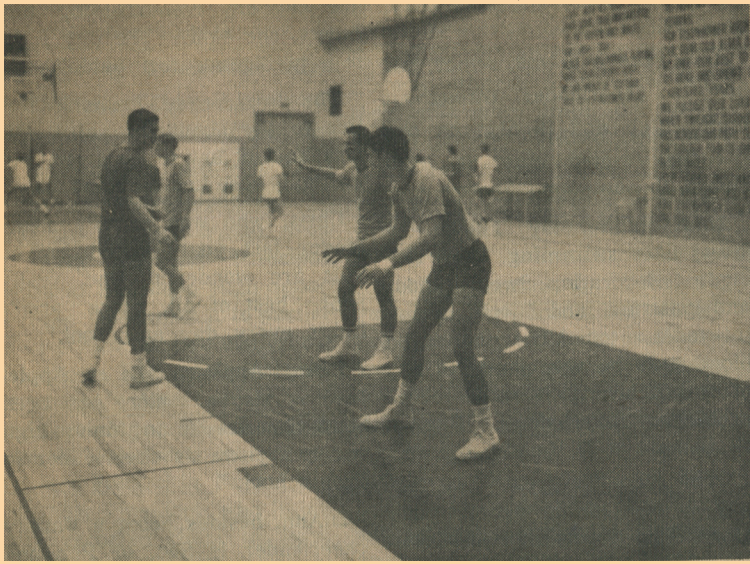
Steve Morris, 17, bass and lead feedback, after 15 minutes of thought; (spelled I) can think of nothing to say about him which is just as well for him anyway.

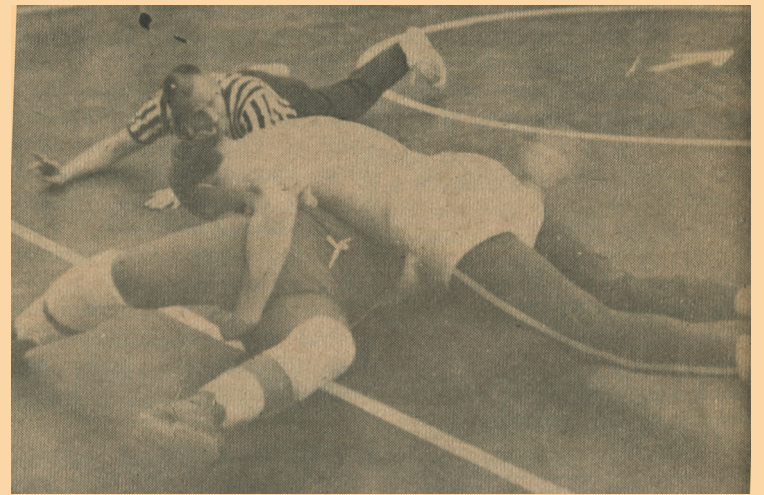

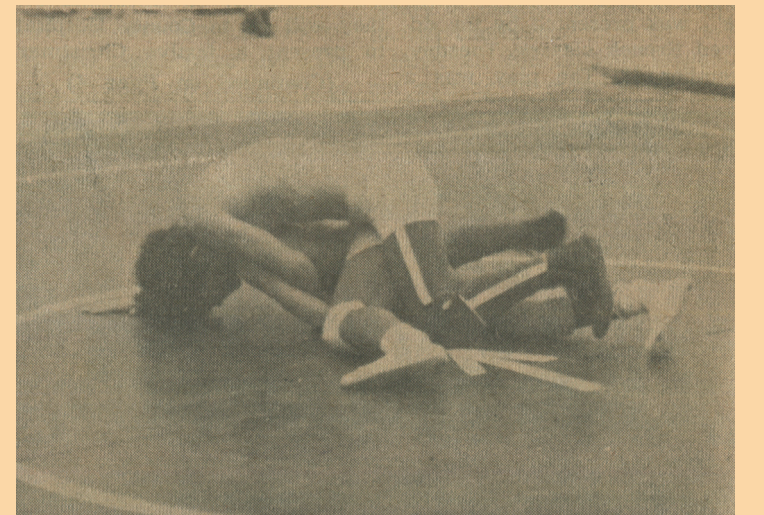
